BLEACHER STAND FOR THE BALL GAMES

Tenders Will Be Called for the Concession to Erect Stand at Fair Grounds.

The question of the erection of a bleacher stand at the fair grounds, for the baseball teams, was again before the civic property committee, at a meeting held on Thursday afternoon, and it was decided to call for tenders for a concession for the erection of a stand.

At a recent meeting of the committee, an offer was received from Ex-Ald. Greenleaf, of Belleville, to erect a stand. He proposed to put up a stand of one section, to accommodate 240 people, with the idea of putting up another section and more if required.

The matter was discussed at some length, and the members felt that tenders should be called for in order to give any person a chance to tender for the concession.

The privilege of selling ice cream and soft drinks at the fair grounds for the ball games was granted to George Palavos, for the sum of \$50.

Work Is Delayed.

Prescott, May 15.—Engineers investigating the feasibility of the canalization of the St. Lawrence river were delayed in their work for a few days at Barnhart's Island in the Long Sault rapids, where difficulty was experienced in rock drilling recently. A shaft is to be sunk in the island and drilling will be carried on striking out horizontally from the shaft below the river bed. Depth and swiftness of the Long Sault rapids prohibited them from drilling vertically from pontoons, according to the regular custom.

TWO OIL PAINTINGS NEED RETOUCHING

But Property Committee Has No Money to Expend on This Work.

John Hagerman, but the civic property committee has no funds with which to do the work, which would entail an expenditure of \$600 or more, and it looks as if the pictures will not receive attention.

Nash brought the matter before the attention of the committee some weeks ago, but no action was taken, and the question was again taken up at a meeting of the committee held Thursday afternoon, and again no action was taken, for the reason that the committee has no money to spend on this work, owing to the fact that the budget for the year is so heavy.

Ald. Craig and Shea suggested that the Kingston Conservative Association might be asked to take up the matter. Some time ago it was suggested that the Historical Society might act in the matter.
