Urging the Methodists To Share in Sacrifices
Toronto, May 15.—In an article in the Christian Guardian Rev. Dr. Bland calls upon the Methodist churches to leave the United church absolutely free after June 10th to place ministers where it pleases so that Presbyterian ministers who are without church may be provided for. He thinks such a spirit of brotherliness will cause many Methodist churches to take care of two instead of one minister and lead to the setting up of an emergency fund.
"If the ministers lead," he says, "who doubts our people will follow? Such a spirit of devotion will sweep across Canada as we know in the beginning of the war. Churches that do not now think of it will find they can provide for two ministers and secure a greatly increased efficiency. An emergency fund will leap into life. Not twenty years of routine union will fuse the three churches as this spirit of brotherhood and sacrifice."

LIBERALS RAISE BIG SUM.
Walter Runciman Gives \$25,000 of \$5,000,000 Fund.
London, May 15.—The Liberal party, which aims at securing contributions amounting to £1,000,000 as a party fighting fund, claims that in three months £200,000 of the sum aim at has been subscribed. The largest subscriber is Walter Runciman, Liberal, M.P., for West Swanscombe, a former government minister. He has given £5,000 to the fund.

Not Being Cheated.

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NAPANEE REGIMENT PARADES TO CHURCH

Wreath Placed on the Soldiers' Monument—Death of Lewis F. Bogart.

Napanee, May 15.—The Frontenac Regiment paraded to the church of St. Mary Magdalene yesterday morning and the church was filled to overflowing. The service was a bright and hearty one and was conducted by the vicar, Rural Dean J. H. H. Coleman, M.A., and the sermon was preached by Canon J. W. Jones, of Kingston, regimental chaplain. After the church service the parade was re-formed and headed by the Kiltie's Band of Belleville, with eight pipers, proceeded down Robinson street to Dundas street and thence to the soldiers' monument in front of the court house, where a handsome wreath was placed on the base, the band playing "The Lament." Prayer was made by Chaplain Canon Jones. The "Last Post" was sounded by the bugler. The parade then returned to the armories and was disbanded.

The people of Napanee are pretty proud of their "soldier laddies" and of the fine soldierly appearance they made on parade. Napanee is mourning the loss of a good citizen in the person of Lewis Ferdinand Bogart, who died at an early hour on Friday morning, 15th instant, a victim of pneumonia. The deceased was a brother of the late Frank Bogart and a nephew of Marshall C. Bogart, of Napanee. The deceased was in his place in church a week ago yesterday, took ill on Monday and died after four days' sickness. The funeral takes place this afternoon at 3 p.m. from his late home, corner of Bridge and Richard streets, where religious services will be held.

NIP PLOT TO MURDER THE JUGO-SLAV KING

Conspirators Also Planned to Dynamite the Royal Palace in Belgrade.

London, May 15.—Police discovery of a communist plot aimed chiefly at assassination of King Alexander of Jugo-Slavia and members of the cabinet, as well as dynamiting of the royal palace, is announced at Belgrade, according to a Central News dispatch.

Seventeen bolsheviks, continues the dispatch, arrived recently to carry out the plot and several of them were captured as they pondered over their plans and maps.

Special police precautionary measures have been taken to frustrate fruition of the plot.

Another Belgrade message said that twenty-five alleged red plotters had been apprehended, and that their plans comprehended dynamiting public buildings as well as "assassination of politicians."

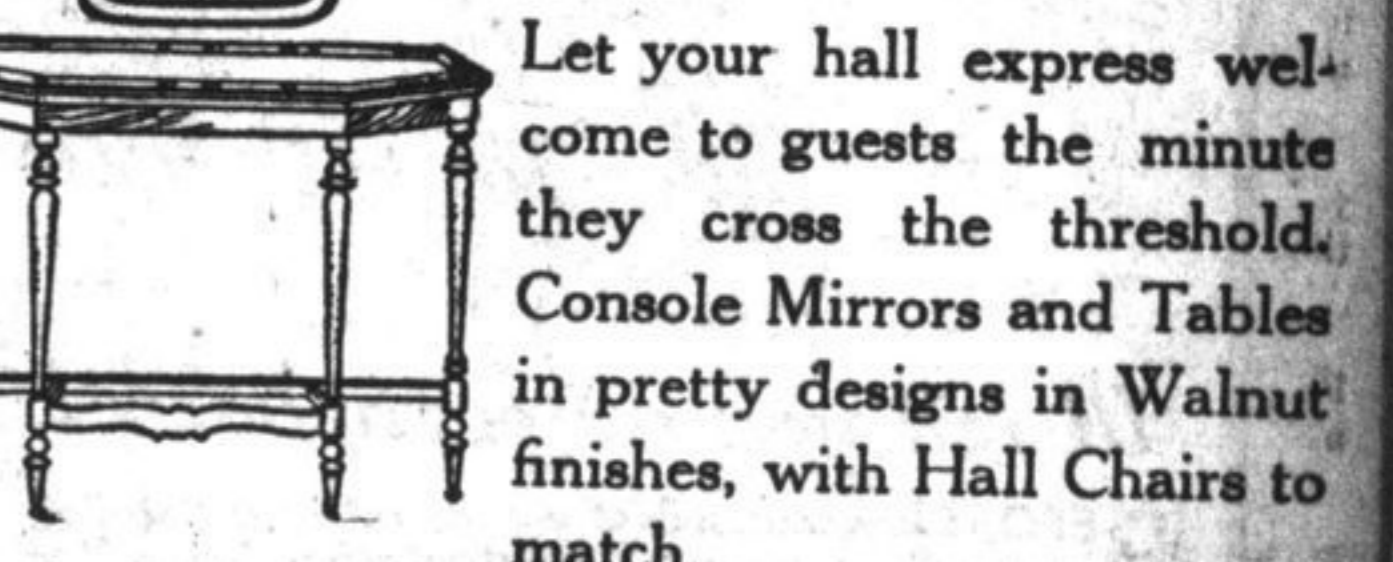

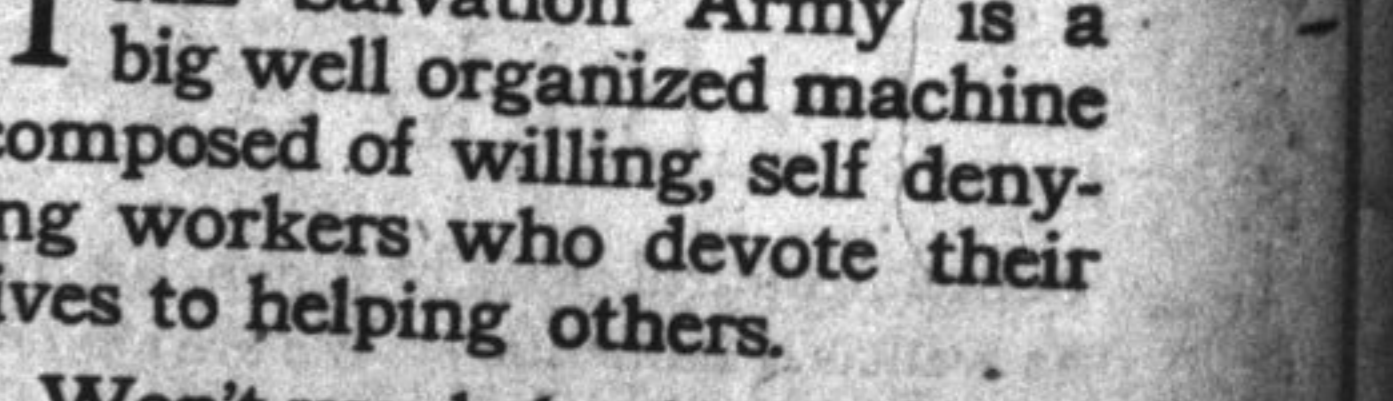
