A MILITARY FUNERAL FOR KEITH WALKER

Solemn Occasion in Yarker -A Boy Who Fell III and Never Recovered.

Yarker, May 18 .- One of the largest funerals ever seen in Yarker was that of Keith Walker, an enlisted soldier in the late war, who died in Kingston. Keith first enlisted in the 37th Battalion but was withdrawn because of his age being too young. Being tall and well built for his age he was not to be turned down but went to Belleville and enlisted there and went overseas but did not see service in France owing to illness that prevented him from entering the war. He never recovered from this filness and was sent back to Kingston and for three years he has been in the hospital in Kingston.

Keith was born in Yarker but spent most of his days with his uncle and aunt in Colebrook. His request was that he be buried beside his aunt in Yarker cemetery. This request was complied with and he was given a military funeral. Captain Harry Babcock with his company from Napanee and the Highland band from Belleville composed the military force.

The remains arrived from Kingston, in Reid's ambulance, and were taken to the Methodist church where a short service was held thence to the cemetery, headed by the band and soldiers, the coffin being carried on the shoulders of six stalwart soldiers, draped in the Union Jack. The firing party took their position by the grave and fired as the band played a military dirge.
