## KINGSTON TOOK OPENING GAME FROM PETERBORO BY 7-4 SCORE

Great Pitching Performance Turned in by "Lefty" Cairns of Kingston Team—Locals Show Well-Balanced Squad and Look Like Real Thing—Heavy and Timely Hitting by Locals Gave Team Big Edge—New Players on Kingston Lineup Did Well—Whitehouse Used on Peterboro Slab—Large Crowd Attended.

Kingston won the first game of the season from the Peterboro aggregation at the Fair Grounds on Wednesday night by the score of 7-4, thus making a real start on the season's baseball programme. The opener was a suitable one for the large crowd of fans that turned out to see the initial performance and local fandom believes that Manager Daley is a better tactician than the boys showed by their play that they have the punch when that punch is needed and they came through with hits at opportune times when they meant runs. The fielding of the locals was better than was expected it would be, considering that the season is comparatively early yet and although the team had five errors chalked against them the majority of them did not result in anything serious happening. However, the play of the locals was above what many of the fans expected and they were mightily pleased with the showing made. Perhaps the most outstanding performer of the evening's play was "Lefty" Cairns, the new addition to the pitching staff. Cairns went in from the start and pitched great ball all the way. It was a rather hard strain on him and towards the sixth frame he tired a little but he came back strong and rounded out a neat performance. Cairns showed the local fans that he had the stuff and many fans predict that he will win a great many games for Kingston this season. In the nine innings that he pitched last night, he walked but one man, had seven strikeouts to his credit and allowed only six hits, a splendid record indeed. Big things are expected of the southpaw and Manager Daley is delighted to have him with the squad.

While the team put up a good game and deserve all the credit that goes with the victory, there is no doubt that they will show even more snap to their play as the season goes on and they will be strong contenders for the C.O.B.L. flag. Manager Daley has the goods and all that is needed now is to have them keep on delivering for the remainder of the season. Kingston has a smart ball club and should go a long way. In their catcher, Arthur Quinn, they have a boy that promises big stuff behind the plate. Quinn played nice baseball last night and with a few more senior games tucked away should be able to stand in there and be second to none of the catchers in the league circuit. He has everything that goes to make up a good catcher. Tommy Halbert, after the first slip, went in and played great baseball for the Kingston team and he put action and pep into his work. Halbert showed a pretty pickup of a hot grounder last night and was in there fighting hard all the time. He should make a high mark in the C.O.B.L. this season. He can show some of the boys how to steal bases and he picked off second from Swanson in the seventh inning. Scott looks as though he will be of value to the team and though he had nothing to do in the outfield, when his time comes, he can be depended on to be going strong. The regulars were all on deck and played good ball but a little tightening up in one or two places would do no harm before the next game with Oshawa on Monday.

**Peterboro Disappointed.**  
"Shiner" Johnston's Peterboro team were disappointed last night when they were handed the gate at the wrong end of the 7-4 register. "Shiner" expected to open up with his club on the winning side of the sheet and he did not take his defeat any too graciously during the fray when he saw that things looked pretty bad for his outfit. The hitting of the locals got under his skin and "Shiner" did not seem to know where he was at for a while. The Peterboro manager put Frankie Whitehouse, former Peterboro Lakeview pitcher, into the box against the locals and he was touched for eleven safe blows. Despite this, however, the young lad deserves credit for the game he turned in and for a boy coming from the juniors, he need not be at all discouraged. He faced the fireworks when things were going hard against him and made no sign to give in. Legon in left field made some nice catches and was responsible for three Kingston players being retired. He also turned in a good batting performance making two hits out of four times to bat. Harrison played his usual good game at first and made one of the feature plays of the night, a double play unassisted. The new Peterboro star, Marchen, did not show anything so wonderful for all the advance notices he got. Ash, Peterboro right fielder, was struck in the face by the ball of his own bat in the second inning and was forced to retire, being replaced by McPherson.

**Kingston Scoring.**  
Kingston started the scoring in the second inning. Somerville the first man up, hit safely but was nullified at second when Cherry hit to short. Peterboro tried to make a double but were too slow in handling the ball. Purvis came through with a nice hit and after Scott had tied to Harrison, Quinn came through with a two bagger, netting two runs. It was a neat little hit over deep short. Cairns, the last batter struck out.

Two more were added in the fourth inning. Somerville again started the fun by lacing out a hit and Cherry followed with a two-bagger while Somerville came on. Purvis hit safely. Scott was thrown at first and Quinn hit to Whitehouse resulting in Purvis being nailed. Cairns was thrown out at first by Helson.

Another pair of runs was added in the next inning. Herby Teepell went to first after being struck by the pitcher and Halbert sent him to second on a sacrifice hit to Whitehouse. Baistone hit safely and Teepell scored. Somerville was nailed at first and Cherry reached first on Marchen's error. Baistone going to third. Cherry stole second and on Whitehouse throwing the ball away when he attempted to catch Cherry off, Baistone went in. Purvis finished by trying to right field.

A single tally came in frame No. 8. Cherry opened with a plural poke and went to third on Purvis' fly to Hall at centre. Scott's hit did the trick. The next two batters were easy outs.

**Peterboro Runs Scattered.**  
Peterboro got one run in the fourth inning. Swanson, the first man up was hit and took first. Harrison went down on Baistone's error. Helson went out at first. Harrison reaching third and scoring on McPherson's long fly to centre.

Peterboro hit a batting stride in the sixth inning and gathered in four hits. Legon, the first batter got a hit but was later caught on the path. Swanson fled to Cherry. Harrison hit safely and was followed by Helson. McPherson reached first on a hit and Harrison counted. Teepell's play from right field was off color and Helson passed over the plate. With two men down in the seventh inning, Rose walked and stole second. Legon hit safely and Swanson hit and scored Rose. Legon was caught at the plate when he tried to make home on the throw from centre field.

Taken in all it was a good game of ball, rather quiet but lively enough for a starter. Manager Daley of the Kingston team and Manager Johnston of Peterboro staged a tongue duel after things got warmed up and the remarks between the two kept them both on the hop. There was no trouble, however, and things passed off peacefully.

The game was opened by Mayor Angrove appearing at bat against Whitehouse. He got a single but failed to run it out.

SHOWING THE GRADUAL GAIN IN CLUBHEAD SPEED IN THE BACK-SWING. TO GIVE CLUB-HEAD THE TURN BACK.

The reason the back swing must be reasonably slow is because the club must be kept under control. The slow back swing does not mean that laborious, stiff, paralyzing back swing we now and then see, yet it must be slow enough for you to keep an absolute control of the club. That is the whole guide to the speed of the back swing—keep the club in your control. This cannot be done when the back swing is quick and jerky. Let the clubhead be thrown back, largely, if not wholly, with the left arm and hand. You catch it up at the top. The club gradually gains speed as it goes back, but let it have time enough for a natural rhythmic action going back.
