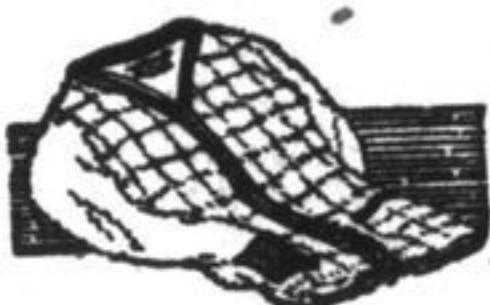

J. H. BIRKETT PASSES AFTER LONG ILLNESS

He Was Treasurer of Canadian Locomotive Company for Forty Years.

John H. Birkett, 106 Barrie street, treasurer of the Canadian Locomotive Works for forty years and a resident of this city for nearly sixty years, died Wednesday night, shortly before eleven o'clock, after an illness extending over two years.

The late Mr. Birkett was born in Newfoundland seventy-three years ago and came to Kingston when he was a lad of sixteen or seventeen. In his early youth he was connected with the vinegar works, Macnee and Minnes

and Skinner's Wholesale drug company. Then he became treasurer of the locomotive works, which post he held till forced by ill-health to retire two years ago.

"He was a part of the institution," said Mr. William Harty, Jr., president of the company, to the Whig on Thursday morning. "Though he has not been active during the past two years he has always kept in touch with what was going on."

The deceased was a very prominent Mason, being a life member of Cataract Blue Lodge, Frontenac Chapter, Hugh de Payens Preceptory, the Scottish Rite, and Ramesses Temple. For three years he filled the office of District Deputy Grand Master of Kingston Masonic district, and attended Grand Lodge. He was largely influential in the organization of the Masonic Lodge at Queen's University. He was well known and highly regarded throughout the Province and in fact throughout the dominion for the sterling qualities displayed as a member of the organizations to which he was attached.

He was an Anglican in religion and attended St. James' Church, where the funeral, which will be under the direction of the Masonic Order, will be held on Friday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock to Cataract cemetery.

Deceased was an honorary member of the Frontenac Club. He is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Katie Wilson, of this city, and by two sons, E. H., of Toronto, and L. H., of Montreal.

Of kindly disposition, the late Mr. Birkett was a splendid type of citizen, enterprising and capable, with a lively sense of his duties as a citizen. He was a man who was constantly engaged in the exploit of problems and new modes of promoting the best interests of the country. While many regarded him as a man of imaginative qualities, it was these very things that gave such strong evidence of his deep desire to further the best in life.

He was an excellent administrative head, active, careful and conscientious and a mathematician of expert capacity.

SUGGESTION

How To Prepare BRISKET CUTS for a Tasty Meal:

DIRECTIONS:—If the Brisket has a large amount of bone some of the latter may be removed to use for soup stock, or else for use as gravy for the warmed off meat. Cook the solid part of the meat until tender. Add a little celery and salt. Turn once during the cooking, which takes from five to six hours, and is best done in a double boiler or fireless cooker. Remove meat from the liquid and place in a shallow pan with skin side up. Put boiled potatoes around meat and brown all in a hot oven for about twenty minutes. Make gravy with the remaining liquid and serve in separately.
