LOCAL MAN INVENTS. DEVICE FOR BATTERIES

Which Will Do Away With Trouble Caused by Corresion.

Persons interested in storage batteries will be pleased to hear that a non-corresive terminal for their batteries has been perfected by Mr. Leo. W. Cochrane of Kingston, Persons having to do with storage battery trouble at some time or other met with considerable annoyance due to a formation of a green substance, commonly known as corresion, usually found around the positive post of their batteries. This corrosion in a short time completely destroys the terminal and the battery ceases to function. All sorts of remedies have been suggested to overcome this trouble but nothing to give satisfactory results has been found. By the application of this new device all danger of corrosion is completely done away with.

Mr. Cochrane has been in communication with some of the larger storage battery manufacturers and latter claim that patented schemes have been developed to meet this trouble, but owing to their high cost and difficulty in attaching and detaching, they have never become a practical improvement. In connection with this new idea Mr. Cochrane says it is so simple that anyone can install one or take it off a battery in a few seconds. It is composed of such materials that absolutely no corrosion is possible as its parts contain nothing that is attacked by the storage battery elec-

The simplicity with which it is installed or removed from a battery will be a great incentive for its adaption by persons who have snything to do with storage batteries. This device is being patented by Mr. Cochrane.
