Caldwell assessed for lots 7 and 8, con. 12, instead of Hydro Electric Co. Xavier Raspberry exempted from one dog assessed on 1925 roll. Moved, McKinnon-Mundell, that court of revision be finally revised and closed for 1925's assessment roll.

Minutes of council meeting held on May 25th. All members present. Minutes of last meeting adopted. Moved, Hermer-Mundell, that by-law No. 273 get its third and final reading signed and sealed. Carried. Accounts passed: W. A. Geddes, fence wire and material, \$38.16; British White, advertising, \$6. Moved, McKinnon-Geddes, that all lands sold on this date, May 25th, shall be sold subject to proper titles being obtained or money refunded. Terms of sale, ten per cent. of purchase money at time of sale and balance arranged by approved joint notes at not more than nine months with interest bearing at 7 per cent. per annum. Carried. Moved, Mundell-McKinnon, that Samuel Allan receive the proportion of government money on his road. Moved, Geddes-Hermer, that an amendment be made of the above motion that John D. Millar use his judgment on granting the government money on the Samuel Allan road declared by reeve. Amendment carried. Moved, McKinnon-Geddes, that Samuel Massey receive the sum of twenty-five dollars for a right of way forty feet wide across lot 21, con. 3, giving him the right to maintain a gate on said road for five years; also commissioner be instructed to have ten dollars expended on said road; commission to make a survey of said road and clerk to draw deeds of same. Carried.

Moved, Mundell-Geddes, that the boundary bridge between Lavant and Palmerston townships is badly in need of repair and the clerk be authorized to notify the Lavant council asking them to pay their portion of the repairing. Carried. Moved, McKinnon-Hermer, that the commissioner be instructed to investigate the following roads: Henry Morrow, Wyman Thomas and Thomas Wilson, also put necessary repairs on said road. Carried. Moved, Mundell-Geddes, that townships of Palmerston and Canonto offer Edward Watson twenty-five dollars for a right of way to cemetery. Carried. Moved, Geddes-Hermer, that Thomas Sargeant be authorized to sell the balance of unsold lots. Carried. Moved, Mundell-Geddes, that the treasurer be instructed to pay Samuel Massey twenty-five dollars on completion of deeds of right of way across lot 21, con. 3. Carried. Moved, Mundell-Geddes, that one hundred and fifty dollars be paid John D. Miller for repairing roads; also that James Gilchrist be refunded two dollars error in dog tax. Carried. Council adjourned to meet August 17th.
