

LIGHTNING KILLS

At J. O. Parrott's, Ernesttown Township-Fire in Drive House Extinguished.

The lightning on Wednesday morning was so severe in Ernesttown township that a horse owned by J. C. Parrott, who resides on the provincial highway about two miles from Odessa, was instantly killed

while standing in the stable. About three o'clock, Mr. and Mrs. Parrott were awakened from their slumbers by the heavy storm. Upon looking out of the bedroom window Mrs. Parrott saw a reflection in the drive shed. As fast as she could put on a few clothes she ran to the shed and found that the lightning had struck the wall and two umbrellas which had been hanging there were ablaze. With a couple of pails of water a fire in the drive shed was extinguished.

Upon going into the stable, about forty feet away, it was found that one of the horses had been killed by the flash, which was seen to strike the building by Mrs. Parrott.

When making an investigation later it was found that the lightning had gone down a post in the barn and how the building did not catch fire is a mystery.
