FATHER SWEARS IN HIS SON AS JUDGE

Wilson, county crown attorney, read the oaths which are taken by a member of the bar when being elevated to the bench.

Mr. U. M. Wilson, on behalf of the members of the bar for the united counties, extended congratulations to the new judge.

Judge Ernest Madden, who commenced his new duties on Wednesday morning when he presided at the sitting of the division court in Napanee, has been a practising lawyer there for fifteen years. His appointment is a very popular one. He is called upon to fill a position to which his father long did honor.

One could not but wish that all who contend that the Presbyterian Church in Canada goes out of being by its blending with another soul could have stood by its alleged death-bed last night.

"If this is death, it is beautiful—There is no valley here," murmured D. L. Moody with his latest breath. So was it in College street last night. The obsequies will be painfully deferred. And, again, if this is a "merger," then merging must be a triumphant business and mergerists must have a lot of fun.

Retiring Moderator.

It seems like a gracious provision of the Great Shepherd of the sheep that the retiring moderator was Rev. Dr. Clarence MacKinnon. (Surely there is a remote flavor of Scotch about that monumental name). Great as moderator, he was surely greater as retiree what delicacy of thought, and grace of expression and charm of manner, and purity of purpose, and felicity of allusion, and glow of passion. What transparent depth of Presbyterianism and profounder depth of Christianity lay in his words like water in a well. How splendidly he interpreted what we all felt, the pain of parting from the old, the eager joy of expectation from the new, that it would not depart from the age-long law which demands sacrifice as the source of life and life more abundant, through whose stern and gracious application the church will prove anew that "we learn in suffering what we teach in song."

The sermon was generally pronounced as the finest, in point of fitness and sympathy and power, that has been heard at an opening assembly for long years past.

It was a winning, wistful, wonderful night, ending with a crash of love and welcome for Dr. Pidgeon such as, so the moderator told us, the assembly scarce ever saw before. The artistic thing about the whole great occasion was the tender backward glance that alternated with the stern and eager forward look. The modernism and the fundamentalism of the great convocation, and of the hearts and heads that formed it were in lovely play and interplay, calling to each other as deep calleth unto deep. Reverence for the old, mingled with "the onward surge," to quote one of the many fine phrases of our mystic moderator.

"In the Cross of Christ I Glory" rolled out like the Confession of Faith set to music. And not a few halted, eyes suddenly bedimmed, as they essayed—was it not just a little cruel of the moderator—the glorious Presbyterian song, "Oh, God of Bethel," to say nothing of that other paraphrase so dear to the northern heart and so warm from the lips of our noble fathers, "To Him that Loved the Souls of Men and Washed Us in His Blood."

I could not but turn and look into the strong and earnest faces. Some were quivering. They were as pilgrims faring forth who cannot but look back and catch once more the glory of the evening sun upon the lights of home.
