GANANOQUE GIRL'S SKULL FRACTURED

Norine Buell Fell Off Verandah —Brought to the Hotel Dieu.

Norine Buell, a young girl whose home is in Gananoque, is in the Hotel Dieu hospital suffering from a severe fracture of the skull as a result of an accident which she suffered on Thursday. The little girl was playing on the verandah and fell a distance of eighteen feet, landing on her head. She was picked up and rushed to the Hotel Dieu by Dr. Bird of Gananoque, and her case was taken over by Dr. J. F. Sparks of Kingston. The little girl was still unconscious Friday afternoon, and was in a still serious condition, but it was stated that hopes were entertained for her recovery.

SENTENCED TO JAIL

For Stealing Iron Off The C. S. L. Vessels.

In police court Friday morning, Magistrate Farrell sentenced Wilfrid Phillips, who pleaded guilty to stealing iron off vessels owned by the Canada Steamships Lines, to not less than one month, and not more than six months in jail.

Albert Newell was found "not guilty" of the theft of iron off the steamers, and the charge against him was dismissed.
