

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

With Regard to the Reduction of the Road Mileage Assumed by Province.

At the June session of the county council, which convenes at the court house on Tuesday afternoon at four o'clock, standard time, it is expected that considerable business will be transacted. The question of a number of roads, which for years have been included in the good system, and which have been transferred to the township system, will be consid-

J. W. Bradshaw, clerk of the county, received the following letter from the Ontario Highway Department and it speaks for itself.

We are forwarding you under separate cover a map of Frontenac County showing in red, the revised county road system as prepared by the department of public highways in accordance with the recommendations of the highway advisory com

This map received the consideration recently of both the advisory committee and a representative committee from your council and the roads designated thereon are the

That a re-adjustment of county wards wharf. road mileage throughout the proince was found both expedient and Oswego yesterday afternoon desirable by the counties themselves, was fully explained at a recent conference by Mr. S. L. Squire, deputy minister highways, who, with the members of the advisory committee. made a special study of the system in every county during the summer and fall of 1924. Accordingly an average reduction-of about twenty-five per cent. has been made in the mileage of county roads throughout the

Special attention has been paid to the interlocking of each county road system with those of surrounding counties and with the provincial highway system as well. As a result of this some counties are experiencing reductions that are considerably in excess of others (being as high as 42 per cent., in one instance) while again certain reductions are necessarily smaller owing to the endeavor to develop an effective and mpartial system of inter-county thoroughfares.

In your system as the map will indicate, there has been a reduction in mileage of 8.1 per cent. The new system totalling 151.2 miles as compared with 164.5 miles in the old. The new system includes 6.0 miles of newly added roads in order that more compact system will result.

The attached by-law forms and schedule blanks are forwarded to you to expedite the adoption by your council of the newly arranged system. You will please note that the minister is desirous of having your by-law before him for final consideration and approval at an early date.
