Miss Nellie Hanley, who has been visiting in Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo returned to Gananoque yesterday.



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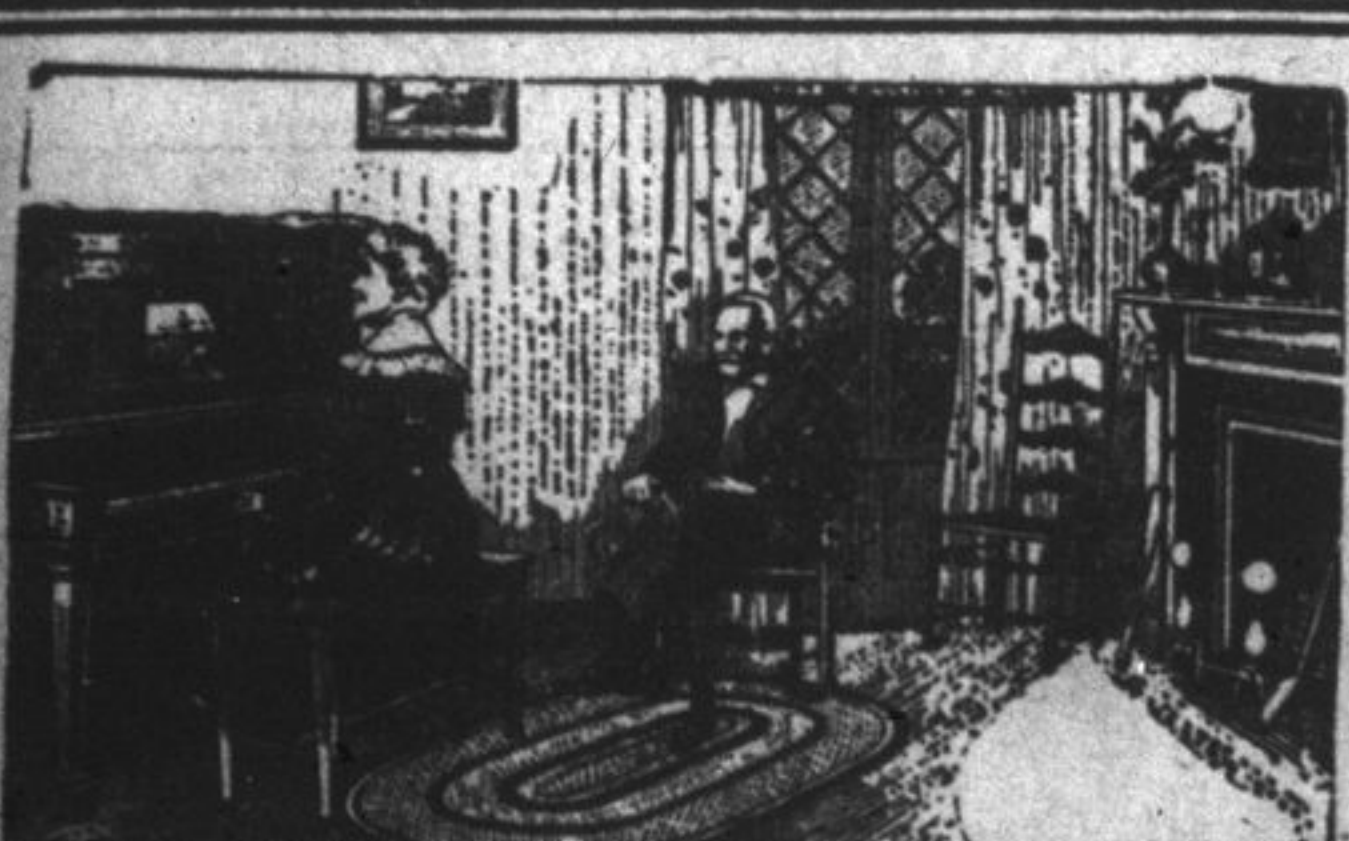
