

On a sheepskin, just above the Viking ship, is the first known copy of the "rules of the road" as applied to navigation. The master-mariner was supposed to hold out his hand before changing his course and it was against the rules to anchor within a cable's length of a lighthouse.

Other objects of interest are two pieces of kindling wood from the ships log carried by Leif Ericson and the instruments, sextant, quadrant and hydrant, used by him. Notice also the fine color-samples of water from the Red, Black, and Yellow Seas, the Blue Danube, and the Green River.




