Harold Cooper, five year old son of Mr. and Mrs. John Cooper, North Burgess, had a narrow escape from instant death at his home when he was accidentally shot through the head by his brother, Cecil, aged eleven years. Mr. and Mrs. Cooper were absent at the time attending a mission service leaving their three children at home. Cecil secured a .23 caliber rifle and was shooting at a mark. Not knowing the other two were in close proximity to the target he continued shooting until he heard a cry which proved to be from his brother, Harold, who had been struck with a bullet which went through his head from the upper lip to the base of his skull. Cecil telephoned to some of the neighbors of the accident who in turned telephoned to Perth for medical aid, and on Friday, the lad was taken to the Perth Memorial Hospital where he is recovering as rapidly as can be expected.

**WILLS STOPPED WEINERT SOON**

Slattery Forced to Quit in Third—Greb Is Still Champion.

New York, N.Y., July 3.—The world's middle-weight ring crown was still snugly fitted to the head of Harry Greb today after 15 rounds of fierce fighting Thursday night with Mickey Walker, welter-weight king. This was the final bout of four thrilling struggles for Charley Weinert in the ring of the Polo Grounds.

Harry Wills, veteran negro heavy-weight challenger, took only two rounds to dispose of Charley Weinert, who was no match for Wills. Wills weighed 213 pounds and Weinert 185.

Jimmy Slattery, sensational Buffalo middle-weight, fell an unexpected victim to a furious attack from Golden Gate centered in the fast flying fist of Dave Shado. Floored three times in the third round, Slattery was saved from the tea-cout when his seconds tossed in the towel.

For thirteen rounds of bruising mill with Walker, Greb fought at close quarters. Then he cut loose. Coming out of his corner in the fourteenth with a terrific right he spun the challenger around with a blow to the jaw. Another right found the same mark as Walker went to the ropes and for the first time since he became champion of one hundred and forty-seven pounders, the Elizabeth, N.J., boy was staggered and groggy.

Greb went vigorously after a knock-out in the fifteenth but instead of a willing foe, he found a wounded lion. Six times Walker ripped sledge hammer driver into the Pittsburgh man's stomach until Greb, recovering, went back at his opponent. A crowd of 65,000 witnessed the fight.

July 11th has been fixed for the holding of a convention by Kent county Liberals, when a candidate will be nominated.

Settlers' effects from the United States show an increase, while there is a decline in settlers' effects from Canada, to the United States.

Of nearly 1,000 aliens who hoped to get into the United States at the Windsor border, only 200 were admitted. Many have waited months in hope of getting their visas.

For the first time, official delegates from the Canadian Medical Association will attend the British Medical Association meeting in England this month.

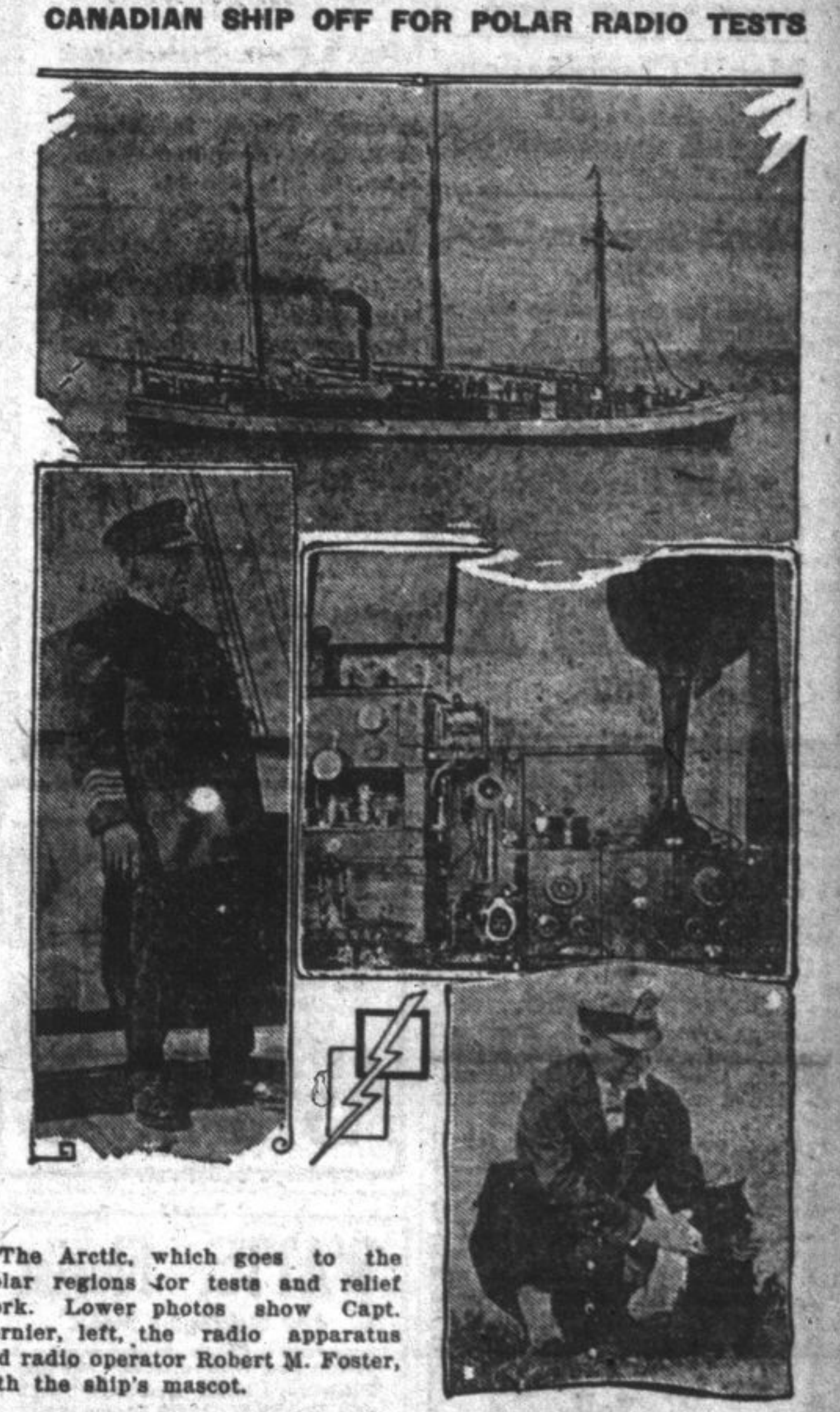
