The registraton of this number in two or three days presents a good-sized task at the registration headquarters of the Douglas library. It is expected that there will be a good number of intra-murals as well as extra-mural students. Members of the former class, who were unable to take the required five courses last winter, may take the rest of them this summer by attending the

The branch of the school at Ottawa, for the study of Canadian history in the archives there, will be under the direction of Prof. D. A. McArthur, head of the history department. This course was founded by Prof. J. L. Morison before he left Queen's. The students are registered as regular students of the Queen's Summer School. This year the subjects to be studied are: "The French and British in Canada, 1763-1812," and "The Struggle for Responsible Government, 1812-1849."


