#### HAS A NEW POSITION

Capt. Leon Fraser, 21st Battalion, Secretary of Ontario Tourist Association.

Many Kingstonians will be interested in the appointment of Mr. Leon Fraser, secretary of the Peterboro Chamber of Commerce, as secretary of the Tourist Association of Ontario.

Mr. Fraser has had a brilliant record in army and civil life. He enlisted with the 21st Battalion as a private. He went to England in May, 1915, and to France in September of the same year, continuing in the field with the army of occupation, and was demobilized in Kingston on May 24th, 1919. In December, 1916, he was promoted to sergeant and later on received his commission as lieutenant. In August, 1918, he was appointed a captain, at the same time being awarded the Military Cross for effective and heroic work while leading his company in the crushing attack at Amiens.

At the close of the war Capt. Fraser compiled and published the Historical Calendar of the battalion, the first of any infantry authorized by the British War office.

#### CALLED TO TORONTO

Rev. M. MacKinnon, D.D., Regina—He is a Queen's Man.

Rev. Murdoch MacKinnon, M.A., D.D., Regina, has had a call to Runnymede United church, Toronto. He is one of five brothers in the church. \$100 worth duty free to United States—Bonafide Tourists are permitted to take \$100.00 in merchandise for personal or household use or as souvenirs free of duty.

The following extract from a letter received from the Treasury Department of the United States Customs Service, explains the privilege which is extended to Tourists visiting Canada:

"Your letter refers to Paragraph 1695 of the 1922 Tariff Act and you no doubt have in mind the proviso given in said paragraph regarding which the Secretary of the Treasury has promulgated regulations, which provide that 'Up to but not exceeding \$100 in value of articles acquired abroad by such residents of the United States for personal or household use or as souvenirs or curios, but not bought on commission or intended for sale, shall be admitted free of duty.'"

#### PRISON GARB REMAINS.

Danger of Escape Stressed by Minister of Justice.

In reply to a protest by T. L. Church, M.P., against taking prisoners from Portsmouth penitentiary to Toronto for trial garbed in prison uniform. Hon. Ernest Lapointe, minister of justice, submits the views of General Hughes, superintendent of penitentiaries, who says in part:

"There is also the matter of escape. Experience has taught that many of the inmates taken out of the penitentiary for various reasons attempt to escape from the officers in whose custody they have been placed." He cites the case of two in British Columbia, and two in Saskatchewan, and adds:

"By being garbed in the prison clothing, description of such inmates may be readily given, and it is much easier to trace a man dressed in a distinctive garb than in ordinary civilian clothing."

Gen. Hughes further states that there would be general disapproval if inmates were taken to court in the clothing in which they were brought to the penitentiary and recommends that no change be made in the present system.

#### Carpenters' Recommendations.

John Fisher, Kingston, represented the local trades at the Provincial Council of Carpenters which met at Windsor, with 122 delegates in attendance. Reports showed an increase in membership of 841. A number of important resolutions were passed. These included recommendations that there be an eight hour day on all provincial works; that the federal and provincial governments, and also all civic bodies, start public works as soon as possible; that the Compensation Act be amended to include all workers; that there be no bonuses to firms locating in the various cities and towns, while another proposed unemployment insurance.

At the home of her son-in-law, Felix Murphy, Mountain View, Ameliasburg township, Mrs. Mary Ann Feeney passed away on Friday after having been ill for several weeks. Deceased was sixty-eight years of age.

The death occurred on Friday at her late home, Newburgh road, Napanee, of Mrs. Julia Maria Miles, relict of the late Mr. Homer Miles, in her 66th year. Deceased had been in poor health for a long period.

Mrs. Denca's Peacor, aged fifty-seven years, died on Thursday at Clayton, N.Y. Her husband and two sisters survive.
