JOURNALIST LEFT \$10,000,000

Sir Edward Hulton Got Part of Receipts From Sale. London, July 6.—The will of Sir Edward Hulton, former well known newspaper proprietor, who died on May 23rd last, has been probated at £2,000,000. A bequest of £5,000 is made to the Catholic Church of Leatherhead, Surrey, where Sir Edward resided, and there are handsome legacies to the testator's domestic servants.

Sir Edward Hulton sold his various newspaper interests about two years ago for £2,000,000. The discrepancy between this figure and the £2,000,000 which is given in connection with the probate of his will as the value of his estate is explained in the fact that the Hulton newspapers descended from Sir Edward's father, who left their value in various shares to members of the family generally.

Varsity CERW WAS FORCED TO SWIM

Much Excitement at Eastern Ontario Rowing Association Regatta at Brookville.

Brockville, July 6.—Marked at the outset by unfavorable weather and rough water conditions, the fifth annual regatta of the Eastern Rowing Association held on the course between Mile Island and Block House Island Park on Saturday developed into one of the most successful events in the history of the organization, as the result of improved conditions during the afternoon. The regatta was held on the Brockville Rowing Club, with five first places, five seconds and one third, captured by the regatta honors with a total of 26 points; Lachine scored 37 points; Ottawa Rowing Club 16; Toronto Argonauts 2; and McGill University 1 point.

The water, which had been real choppy all morning, grew very rough, while the three eights were squaring away. Lachine led from the start, with Varsity right on their rudder, and Ottawa considerably behind. Nearing the western end of the breakwater the backwash from the shore swamped the Varsity boat and their crew were precipitated into the water. Ottawa rowed ahead, and when near the finish line this boat also swamped. The coxswain, Venso, a non-swimmer, was thrown a life-buoy from one of the official boats, and the remainder of the two crews were rescued by boats that stood by to render assistance. ANOTHER STRIKE AT GENERAL HOSPITAL

Twelve Carpenters and Eight Painters Went Out on Monday Morning.

On Friday last at the General Hospital clinic building, the plumbers who were at work on the job, walked out on strike owing to the fact that one of the helpers, who was engaged in steam-fitting work was a non-union man. The situation in connection with the building was made worse on Monday morning when twelve carpenters walked out on strike stating that the foreman and two laborers were engaged in putting in seats and bolting, which they claimed was carpenters' work and these men were not union carpenters. As a result of the walk-out of the carpenters, eight painters went out in a sympathy strike and building work at the hospital is now at a standstill.

Officials of the union were in conference on Monday morning with Mr. Secord the contractor, but he contended that the matter was out of his hands as he had sub-let the contract. The masons were allowed to finish up their work at noon and were therefore unaffected by the strike. John Fisher is busy trying to effect a settlement.

MACHINE GUN PLATOON DID VERY FINE WORK

Brig-General Hill Complimented Capt. Barnum and His Men at Camp.

No. 1 Company of the 4th Battalion, C.M.G.C., completed its annual training on July 1st at Barrieffield, with the inspection by Brig-Gen. F. W. Hill, C.B., C.M.G.C., D.S.O. Elementary gun drill was carried out, under standard test, after which the company went through minor tactical schemes, advancing with guns, ammunition and water from 650 yards to 300 yards firing from intermediate ranges on four different class of targets after which the general inspected the number of hits on each target, expressing great satisfaction with the results found and the manner in which the company manoeuvred down the range.

As a result of the above, the following prizes were awarded to the under mentioned members of the company: Sergeant W. Leeman, gun team—Best machine gun shooting on advance. Sergeant G. Richardson, gun team—Best shooting at known ranges. Sergeant V. T. Hammond—Best score, machine gun. Private G. Davy—Second best score, machine gun.

The inspecting officer tested the company in their knowledge of the tactics of a machine gun platoon in action. Captain Barnum, who was in command of the platoon, was told that the enemy was holding a strong position between Fort Henry and the wireless station. He was to go forward and pick out suitable gun positions and a means of approach under cover for his platoon. He was then to come back and lead his platoon into action. The enemy had to be driven out of their position before the infantry troops could advance. The scheme was successfully carried out.

Brig-Gen. Hill addressed the company, complimenting all ranks on the way they carried out their annual training.
