SCHOOL ATHLETIC PROGRAMME ISSUED

Kingston is included in the Programme Outlined by Athletic Commission.

On or about the first week of October the Ontario Public, Separate Continuation and High School athletic championships will be held in Toronto under the auspices of the Ontario Athletic Commission.

At a joint meeting of the commission with the Western Ontario Association, the Central Ontario, Ottawa district and Kingston district school representatives at the commission offices, a set programme for this championship meet and for the sectional meets was drawn up as appended.

The commission will stand the expense of the winner in each of the events given below as returned from these sectional meets to the provincial meet-railroad and hotel-and in the St. Lawrence Leaguewill supply the medals as prizes not only for all events in this final meet, but also a quota of medals for each sectional meet. Sections may send two representatives in each event but must finance the second candidate between Brockville and Napanee in themselves.

In practice swings with a golf club you are never conscious of body action at all. That is the way the real swing should be made. One of the most difficult lessons in all golf to learn is that those seemingly simple practice swings you make, without conscious effort, are exactly the swings that would drive the ball far and straight if you would only put them on the ball. Reverse yourself for experiment purposes-when you swing in practice, swing with all the force and might you can command. Then, when you swing at the ball, swing easily, as if you didnt mean it at all. This will probably give you the surprise of your life, and will open before you the true path to ease and rhythm in golf.


