MOTOR NOTES.

Sudden skidding wears a flat place in the tread of tires and causes separation in the carcass—all due to sudden application of brakes and excessive sliding of wheels.

A grabbing clutch of the "cone" type can be made to operate smoother by applying neatfoot oil. Heat the oil to assure an even application.

There is a definite disadvantage in having too much oil in the crankcase. This frequently causes the piston rings to stick in the grooves and the grooves fill with carbon.
