

wrist action blend together in such tired. unison of action that it is hard to say which is one and which the other. One good point to observe is that the HORNSBY NOW breaking upward of the wrists should not take place quickly in the back swing. Delay wrist-breaking as the club starts away from the ball, and at the same time promote hand action-that is have the club very definitely in the hands at this starting point. Then through the hands reach outward with the club rather than upward. When you have reached outward a pull against the shoulders will be felt. Then let the body turn and at the same time let the wrists and arms elevate the club upward to the top. If the wrist action is too soon in the back swing the club will go up directly and not have the wide, sweeping effect that takes the ball so crisply.

#### PUZZLE PLAYS.

The Play. There are two men out and runners on first and third. A double steal is staged. The throw to second eats the runner and he is touched with the ball by the man covering before he reaches the bag.
