Belleville has tried more or less all summer to win a game but each time somebody throws a wrench in the machinery and on Saturday "Peeny" Mills gunned up the works, for with two out and two on, Arnel, the Kingston catcher, hit a screeching liner to left field and Mills in trying to trap the ball for an out let it roll to the cars and this play wrote "his" to the game from a Belleville standpoint and although they never got the runs back they threw quite a scare into the Limestone crew and in the ninth nearly staged a rally that pulled the game out of the fire, but Goyer mopped the plans by striking out Young, who hurried for Kingston, was given sensational support by the whole team, and especially Daley in left, who made two hair-raising catches, that certainly changed the complexion of the game. 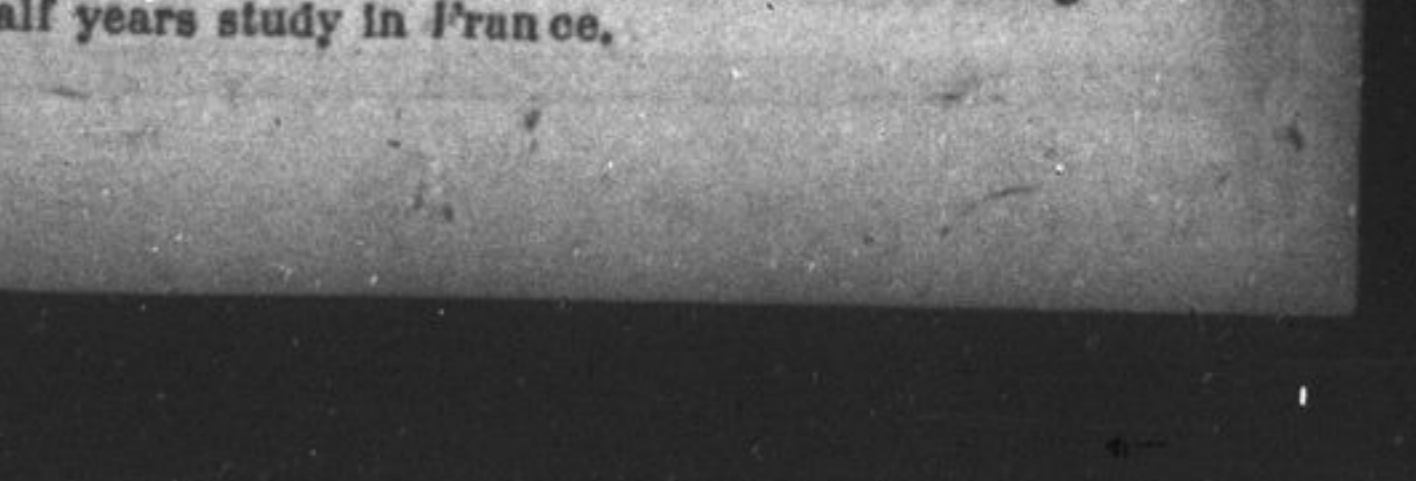
"In the face of what is considered an unjustified criticism of court made by Clarence Darrow, I feel that I must protect the dignity of my court," said the judge.
