**AT TREADGOLD'S STORE.**

The Latest Invention in Collapsible Boats is Being Exhibited.

The latest invention in collapsible boats is being exhibited at Treadgold's Sporting Goods store. It is a boat which when folded up, weighs only seven and a half pounds and when filled with air can easily be lifted by a small child. It is guaranteed to carry 750 pounds and has four air compartments, in case of one being punctured the other three will still be intact and capable of carrying a heavy weight. One of its main qualities is that it cannot be tipped over, with the exception of a deliberate attempt.

The boat was given a test at the Kingston Yacht Club Thursday afternoon and withstood the hardest trials. It is capable of carrying four persons comfortably, but to show that it lives up to its standard, five people were taken out in it and paddled around. A heavy wind was blowing at the time of the test, and the boat was taken out in the rough water, being handled very easily.

Oars or paddles may be used with the boat or if speed is desired, a motor engine can be attached to it. The feature of the boat is that it can be folded and carried in a small bag, into which the pump used, also fits.

A large number were at the Yacht Club dock to witness the test and were very much impressed with the fine qualities of the boat. It is claimed that these boats have been known to carry eleven people. This is the first boat of its kind to be in Kingston.
