crochet hook. Begin by casting on are looser under the arm. 70 stitches. *Knit plain ten rows The careful woman never hangs (five ridges), and on the next row a sweater on a hook or nail, when knit the stitch repeat between these garment out of shape. Either keep stars to end of row Next row purl, it in a drawer or else hang it Mr. William Waldron, after six dropping wrapped stitches, * repeat through an embroidery hoop which between these marks (*) once; then you have wound with a pretty ribrepeat for entire sweater, increasing bon (and hang the hoop to a nail) in the next five plain knit stripes one stitch each side on the first, fifth and ninth rows and two stitches each Oshawa, will be among the former side on the third and seventh rows till there are 140 stitches.

posite end, * repeat between these and state.

marks (*) till you have eight groups of four stitches not worked. on each needle.

On next row knit 20 stitches, bind off 36 stitches (this should be the fifth plain knit row of stripe). On remaining 20 stitches work two inches, working across four more stitches from short rows every second row. Make other shoulder in this same way.

Cast on 36 stitches for front of neck and continue working four more stitches each side till there are 140 stitches on row. Finish front same as back. Pick up 70 stitches around armhole, knit nine rows plain, bind off on wrong side and
