ELEMENTS OF ENCOURAGEMENT

Walls continue to emanate from opponents of the Mackenzie King government that the country is going to the dogs; that the manhood of Canada is flocking to the United States and that business is practically paralyzed by the administration's policy on the tariff.

It is only to be expected that in almost every occupation there should be periods of depression. Doubtless some industries feel the pinch at times. When money is dear and tight business languishes.

There are still left in the country those who are patriotic enough to find it good enough for them, and, being good enough, do not run it down and traduce it in the face of a world that is recognizing the Dominion more and more as an increasingly important factor in the world's business and production.

With regard to the question of the relative prosperity of the two countries, the favorable trade balance of the United States, from statistics available earlier in the year, represented about \$8 per capita of their population; while the Canadian balance represented about \$28 per head of our population.

Mr. Meighen agrees that exports are all right providing they are of the right kind, but he does not very clearly explain or go into that part of the subject. He creates the impression that it is not a good thing to export raw material, but those who know their Canada know that our natural resources, if not illimitable, are not likely to be seriously depleted for many years to come.

CANADA'S RESOURCES. When opposition is raised to the export of raw material from this country, those who are against shipments on the ground that these resources are strictly limited have not a full conception of what these really are.

We have reserves which are unsurpassed, except possibly in Russia and Siberia, and with our modern methods of forest conservation, reforestation and the like, Canada is not running any very great risk in parting with some of her raw material in that particular.

As to minerals, not a man living knows the mineral wealth of this country. Our coal reserves in the western field alone represent a very considerable fraction of the total coal deposits of the world.

Our development is pretty sure to be along lines that will help, perhaps to discover untold fields of wealth hitherto undreamed of.

RESTLESS CHINA.

The disturbances which are going on in China are indicative of two things: First, the aim of a large and influential group to set in motion a more comprehensive democracy; and second, to shut out foreign influence.

Fortunately those in charge of these exhibits, whether they are legislators, doctors, or nurses, are usually people of vision and tolerance. They recognize that to educate a community along health lines they must start on a common footing for all, and have as their slogan "good health for everybody."

Now it is not hard to see what is going to happen to a community when they have had a full week's training or education in health matters. The figures before and after these health weeks tell their own story.

I refer to the fact of these organizations getting together. There are the Presbyterians, Methodists, Baptists and other Protestant churches, Roman Catholics, Orange Societies, Hebrew Organizations, Masons, and other fraternal societies, Ladies' Clubs, and so forth.
