KINGSTON OLD BOYS' ASSOCIATIONS

TORONTO.
The Kingston Old Boys' Association of Toronto was organized on the 18th of April, 1903, and incorporated on the 3rd of April, 1907. This clause from the constitution sets forth the objects of the association: "The object of this association being to bring together all former residents of Kingston and County of Frontenac now residing in Toronto, to promote the general welfare of the members of this Association, and to enable them to visit the Old City annually in a body, thereby renewing their acquaintance with the Old City."
Meetings of the Association are held at stated times during the year, as well as other gatherings of both a social and business character.

MONTREAL.
The Kingston Old Boys' Association, in Montreal, has been formed since 1911. At that time, the association had 100 members, the president being C. M. Strange, with L. L. Henderson as vice-president, and Hugh C. Walkem as secretary-treasurer. During that year, a very successful dinner was held at the Engineers' Club.
In May, 1912, the second annual dinner was held at which Prof. Adam Shortt, of Kingston, gave a very interesting address. At this time, the membership had increased to 145, and the officers were the same as for the year 1911, except that Mr. T. E. Merritt replaced Mr. Henderson as vice-president. No more dinners have been held since the war, and no action taken to reorganize the association, but former Kingstonians in that city are enthusiastic over the Old Home Week, and a record crowd is expected.

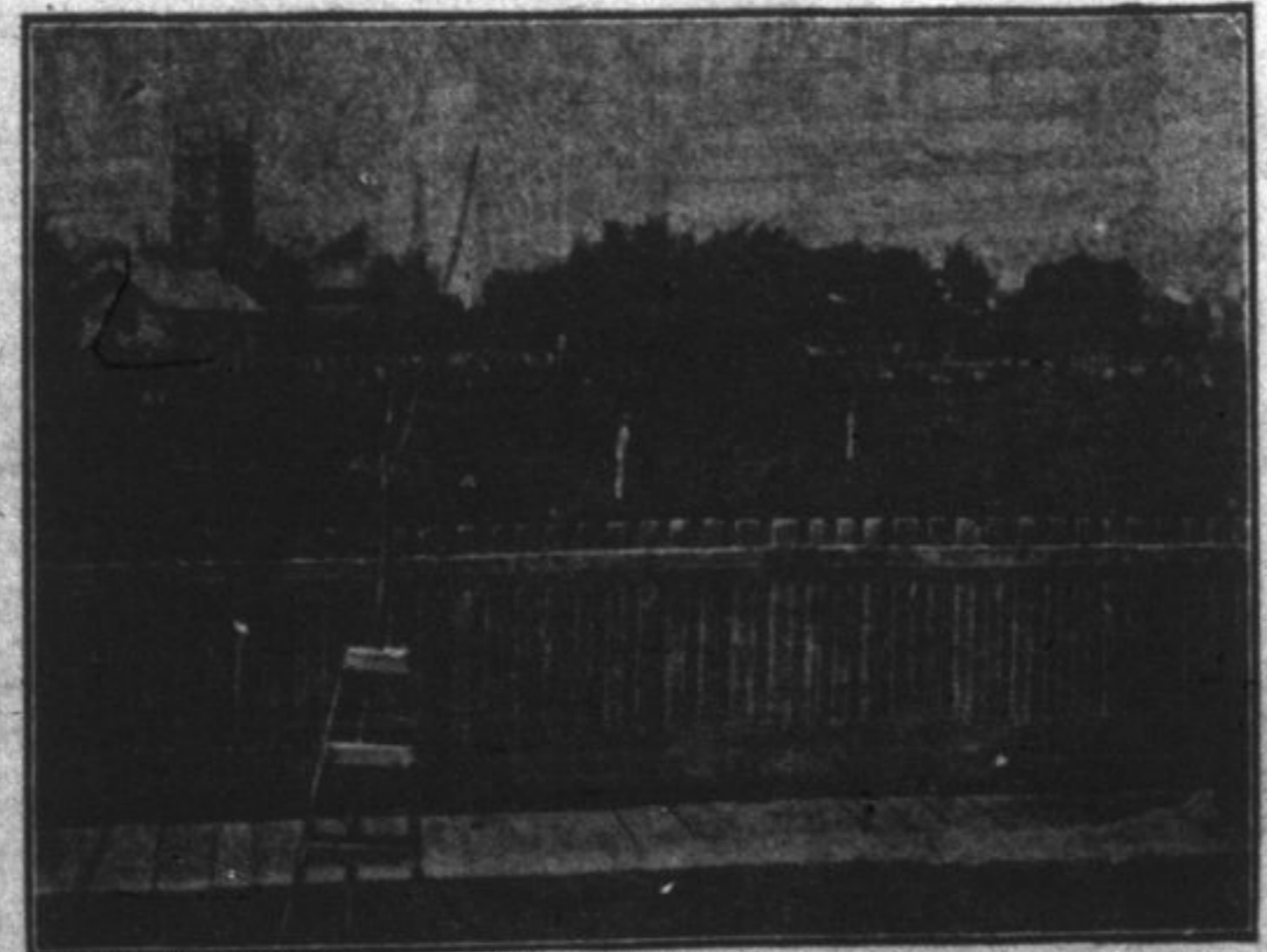

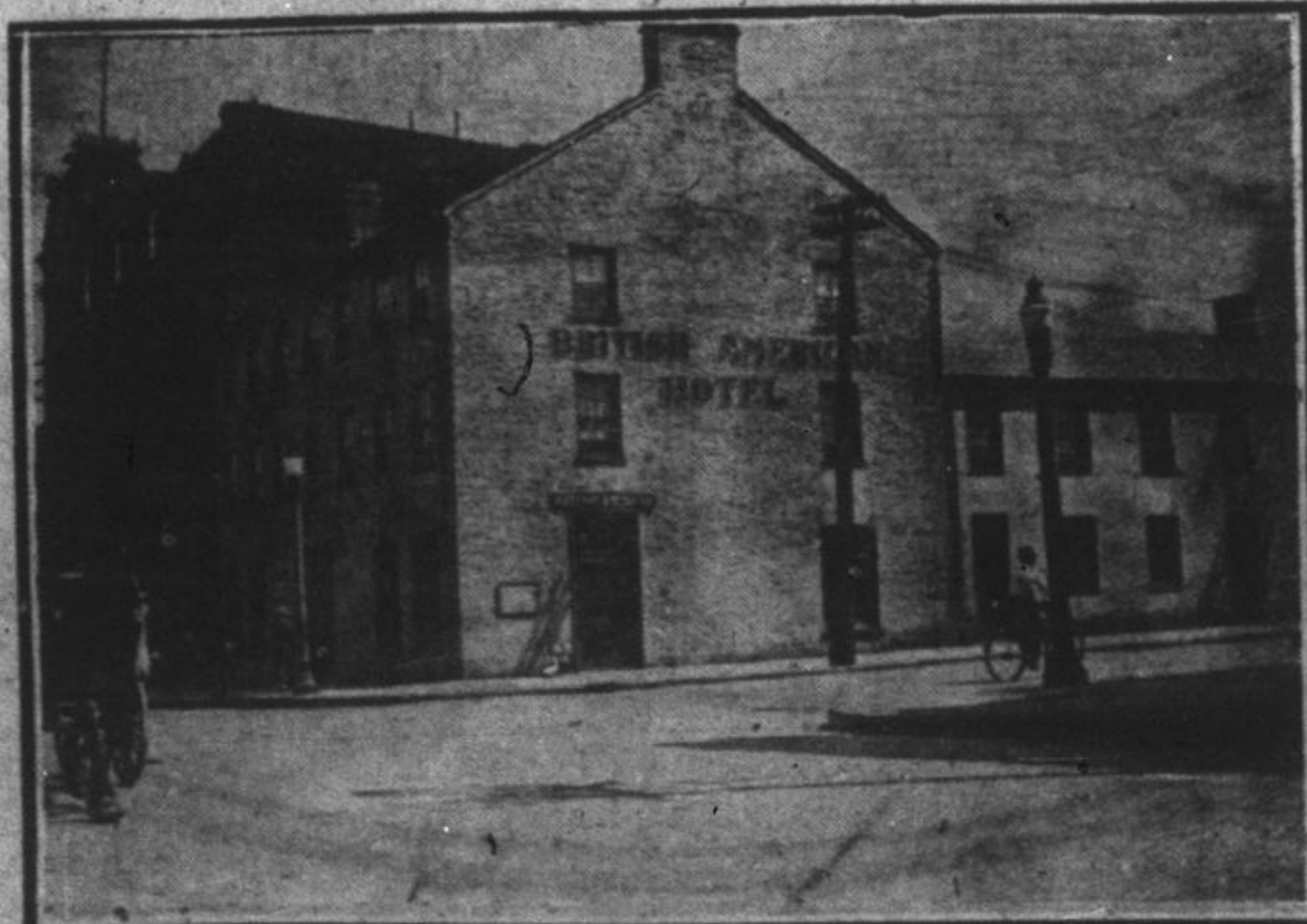

In speaking to a Whig representative, regarding the reunion, Dr. John H. Bell said:

"As an ex-mayor of Kingston, I cannot help recalling that the first grand reunion held by the City of Kingston, which took place in the year 1903, while I was serving my last year as Chief Magistrate. On that occasion, about 10,000 boys and girls returned in answer to our invitation, and now after the lapse of 22 years, I feel equally as anxious, that the present reunion may be even more successful.

"I well remember many who materially assisted to make the reception in 1903 a success. Some have long since passed on to their great reward, but not without leaving behind them a record of faithful, devoted service, given not only on this occasion, but in thousands of ways in the interest of the city of their birth.

"You will pardon me if I briefly recall a few names of the active workers on this occasion, as follows: Mr. E. J. Barker Pense, M. P. (deceased); Mr. J. Morgan Shaw, ex-mayor; Mr. Donald McIntyre, ex-mayor and then city solicitor; Dr. Edward Ryan, ex-mayor; Mr. R. E. Kent, ex-mayor; Mr. R. N. F. McFarlane, ex-mayor; John J. Behan (deceased); Mr. Thomas Donnelly (deceased); John McDonald Mowatt, K.C., ex-mayor (deceased); Mr. Frank J. Hoag, ex-mayor, and many others, equally worthy of mention did space permit. I believe of all those mentioned only two remain still in harness and actively engaged in the interest of their native city, viz.: ex-mayor R. E. Kent and ex-mayor R. N. F. McFarlane."

OTTAWA.

Ottawa has no permanent Kingston Old Boys' Association, but judging by the enthusiasm over the present reunion, it is safe to say that the Capital will soon have an association for the former Kingstonians. The present club in Ottawa was formed a few weeks ago. The following officers were elected:
