

### THE AMERICAN DAY OF OLD HOME WEEK

#### Horse Races at Fair Grounds—Softball Game at Cricket Field.

American Day for the Old Boys celebration was the order on Wednesday and many American visitors came to Kingston to spend a day among old friends. The visitors were met by Mayor Angrove and welcomed to the city and the famous Marra band of Watertown, N.Y., rendered several selections in the grand-stand at the Fair Grounds during the afternoon, much to the delight of the large number of people that heard it.

The American band paraded from the city buildings to the Fair Grounds, headed by Mayor Angrove, Miss Canada and Miss America. During the afternoon the American National Anthem, "The Star Spangled Banner," was played by the band, while the crowd stood and Miss America sang the national song of the United States, accompanied by Marra's band.

The mayor, in a short speech, spoke of the pleasure it gave Kingston to have the American visitors here and hoped that they would enjoy their brief stay in the city.

#### The Horse Races.

The stands were treated to some highly exciting racing during the afternoon and the 2.40 trot and pace and 2.25 trot and pace were on the programme. Four heats were run for the 2.40 class which was finally won by Sid Hall, owned by J. Mullin, of Belleville. ### SEVEREST LIGHTNING AND RAIN STORM

Morton's end. She had been in usual health of late and her death was entirely unexpected. Mrs. Morton was very nervous and greatly agitated during the storm when it was raging at its worst.

The late Mrs. Morton was an Anglican in religion and a member of St. Luke's church. She is survived by eleven children, including three sons, Angus, John and Joseph of this city, and seven daughters, Mrs. W. H. Lloyd, Brockville; Mrs. B. Vallias, Kingston; Mrs. D. Doran, Owen Sound; Mrs. Clark Hamilton, Gananoque; and Georgina, Floeste Mary and Dorothy, of this city. The funeral will take place on Saturday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock to Cataraqui cemetery from her late residence, in charge of John Cornelius, undertaker.

#### Mast Was Struck.

During the storm, the aft mast on the steamer Padaris, which is unloading coal at Sowards', was struck by lightning at the top and split about five feet down. Luckily the lightning did not run down the mast, as the boat might have been destroyed.

#### A Heavy Rain.

More rain fell Wednesday night and Thursday morning than during the whole of July and more than is the normal amount for the whole month of August. The Queen's instruments showed 3.39 inches, while on August 1st, 1.15 inches fell. The average for August is 2.8 inches.

#### Barn Was Destroyed.

About five o'clock Thursday morning a barn at 17 Macdonnell street, owned by Harold Sargent was struck by lightning and completely destroyed. There were twenty-one chickens and a dog in the building, as well as a box of valuable tools. An alarm was sent in to the fire department but the lines had been damaged in the storm and a message could not be got through. Other means were employed but the fire had gone too far when the brigade arrived and the building is a complete loss. The damage is estimated at twelve hundred dollars.

Many people awakening Thursday morning found things in a peculiar condition. One well known resident of Earl street went down in the basement to get a bottle of milk but much to his surprise, found it submerged in water.

The following towns in the vicinity have reported no damage: Wolfe Island, Odessa, Cataraqui, Westbrook, Collin's Bay and Sharbot Lake.

The storm had one redeeming feature about it, in that it cleaned down the pavements. Following the heavy rush of traffic during the week, the pavements, etc., the paved streets were in a dirty condition and needed a good washing down. They got it.

### A Fine Display Of Union Jacks

#### Old Boys' Reunion Decoration Committee indebted to Mrs. Egerton Vanliven.

Thousands of people have commented upon the fine display of Union Jacks that adorn the business streets of Kingston. Especially have they been admired by visitors and tourists, who declare that nowhere else have they witnessed such a multitude of flags. These flags were placed with the merchants and others by the Municipal Chapter of the Daughters of the Empire. An out-of-town representative sold eighty flags and departed. The chapter then called upon one of its energetic members, Mrs. Egerton Vanliven, Alfred street, to complete the canvass. She went at the task with spirit and determination, and succeeded in disposing of 125 flags; seventeen orders were received by telephone and the city purchased twenty additional for use around the city hall. Thus some 242 flags were placed. Mrs. Vanliven delivered her share of the banners, a task in itself. She is the educational secretary of the George Richardson Chapter, I.O.D.E., and great credit is due for the excellent work she did. The decoration committee of the Old Boys' Reunion feel deeply indebted to Mrs. Vanliven for her assistance in beautifying the city.

Decorations Severely Up.
