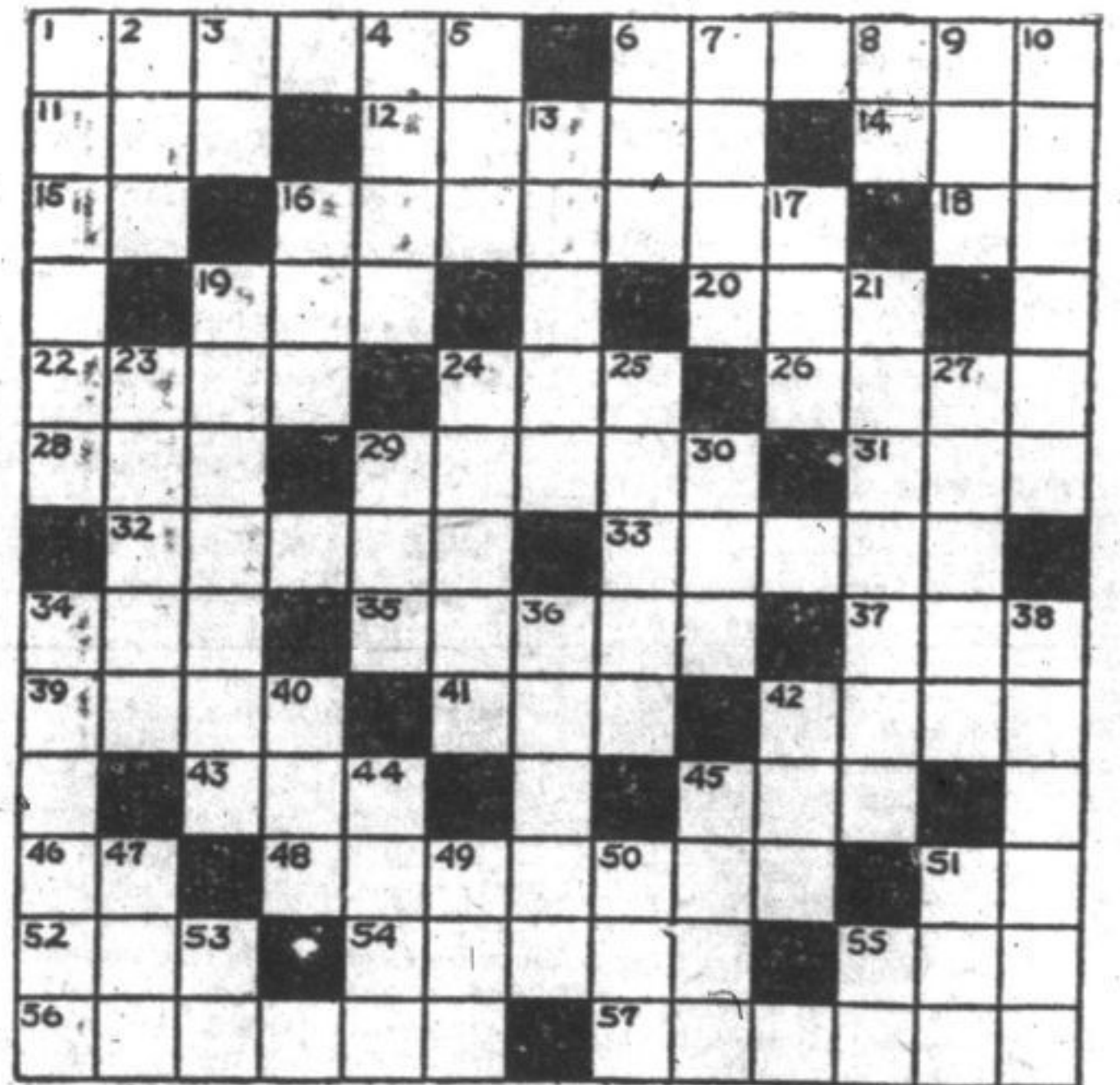

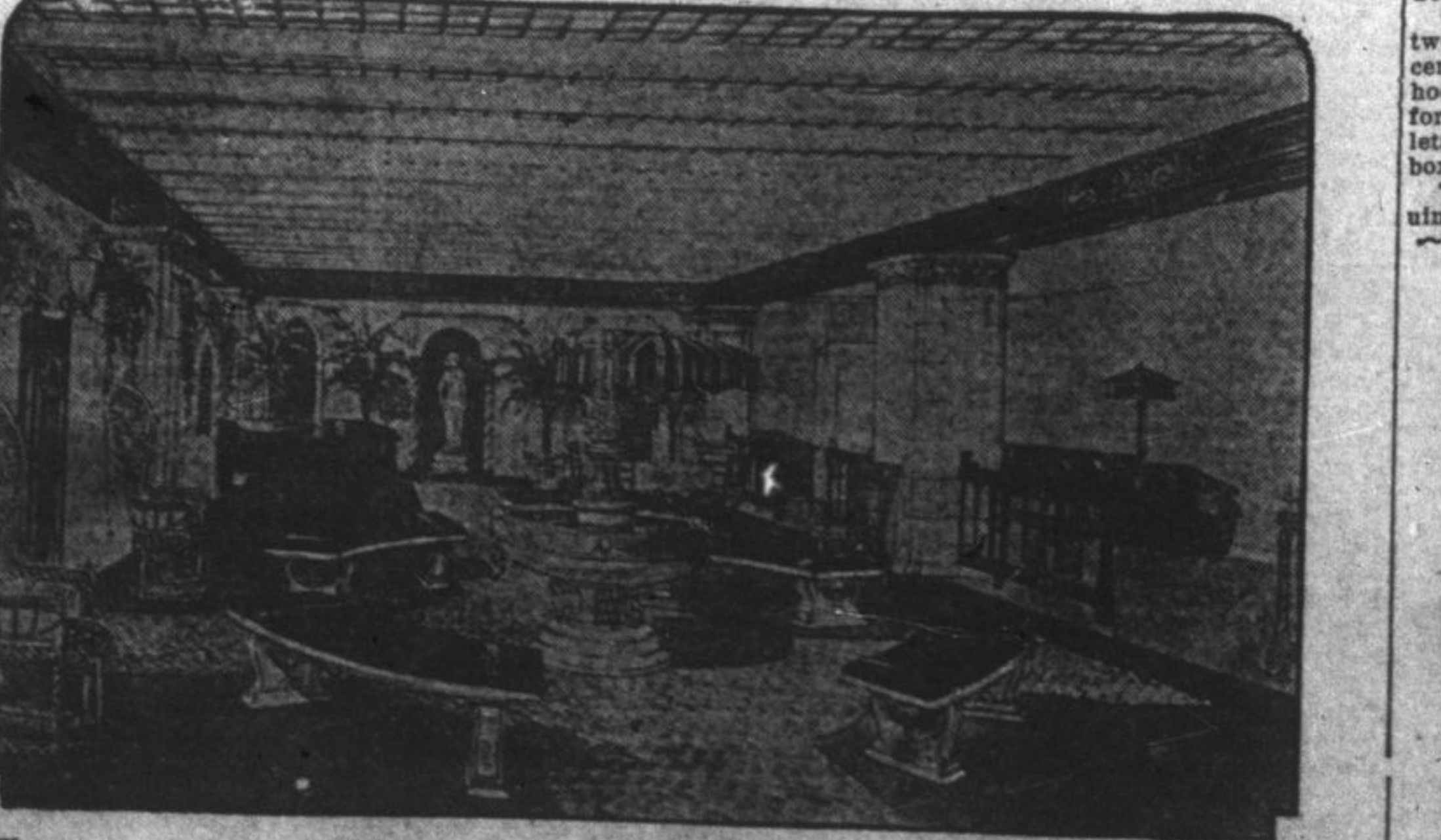
Arrested For Mail Thefts.
