Dr. M. W. Harte, a medical practitioner in Prescott for the last thirty-five years or more, died Tuesday morning in the A. A native of the county of Dundas, he was a graduate of Queen's University and practised for a brief period in Bishop's Mills before becoming established in Prescott, where he was a well-known figure in the community.
