**To Erect a Church.**  
Those citizens of Renfrew and vicinity who worshipped in St. Andrew's Presbyterian church, Renfrew, before 19th June and were opposed to union with the Methodist and Congregational bodies, will build a church on Horton street, Renfrew, on the site donated by Mrs. A. Barnett. A building at the rear of the property donated will be converted into a Sunday school hall and be ready for occupation by the 1st of September. A church to seat 400 people will be erected, and made larger, to conform with former plans, should funds warrant it.
