GROWTH OF HYDRO POWER IN KINGSTON

Consumers Now Total 5,218 - Street Lighting Costs 91 Cents Year Per Capita.

The growth in popularity of Hydro power in Kingston is graphically shown in the seventeenth annual report of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario for 1924.

Since the inauguration of the service in 1918, domestic service has shown the greatest growth. The number of consumers had risen from 1,873 in 1918 to 5,218 in 1924.

The power service also has shown a healthy increase. The number of consumers has risen from 104 to 138, the average horsepower from 1,576 to 2,575, the revenue from \$32,025.98 to \$51,240.56.

The consumption in the commercial light service has jumped very much. In 1918 it was 686,846 kilowatt-hours, in 1924 1,811,918 hours.

The total number of consumers of all kinds of power in Kingston is 5,218. In 1918 it was 2,662.

WATER IS LOWERED IN LAKE ONTARIO

River Channel at Rochester, N.Y., Dangerous and is Being Dragged.

Rochester, N.Y., Aug. 20.—Concern has been caused here by the fact that Lake Ontario is smaller and shallower to-day than it has been the last quarter of a century.

At the port of Rochester the river channel is dangerously shallow and a United States Government dredge is working to deepen it for the increasing number of coal freighters that are clearing the port loaded to their last plimsol mark.

Canadian pleasure and business boat owners, navigating the shallow waters on the Bay of Quinte and other eastern bays, have been especially inconvenienced by the sudden fall. Shoals, marked for plenty of water on the charts, have been discovered dangerously near the surface and groundings have been numerous.

A HOUSE OF REFUGE. The Schermierhorn Bequest May Be Extended a Bit.

The Lennox and Addington county council is to meet in special session at the Court House, Napanee, on Sept. 1st, for the purpose of completing the new county road by-law which has had its first and second readings, also to consider the report of the special committee appointed to report on the House of Refuge question.

A County House of Refuge is not a pressing necessity at the present time says the Napanee Express, as arrangements are already in force for taking care of the County's poor in the Kingston House, and Prince Edward County also has room in its House of Refuge to take care of a considerable number inmates more than they have at present.

Should the county decide that a House of Refuge is not needed at present, no doubt an extension of time could be secured from the executors of the fund left for this purpose, and it could accumulate for another short term of years until a County House of Refuge is needed.

Canada's Story Day by Day

August 20th. It was on this day in 1731 that Gilles Hocquart took up his duties in Quebec as Intendant of New France. His regime was a long one lasting until September of 1748 and during that time he carried on a really useful and constructive programme. He encouraged both agriculture and export trade, the former by establishing fairs at which the farmers distributed their wares and the benefits of their experiences. Canada's first reported favorable trade balance was under Hocquart for by 1741 the exports exceeded imports and French money was discounted in Quebec. At that time paper money was in circulation in Quebec, and when French gold and silver coins were circulated they disappeared into the hands of their possessors and did not reappear until after the Conquest. The good Gilles Hocquart was succeeded by the Intendant Bogot Bigot, the last and by far the worst of all the occupants of that post.

KINGSTON BENEFITS FROM MOTOR CAMP

Scores of Tourists Are Also Going to Hotels and Rooming Houses.

That the Kingston motor camp at Lake Ontario Park is a big benefit to hotels, rooming places and merchants generally is the opinion of many people who know. So far this season 800 automobiles have stopped at the camp, there being nineteen on Wednesday night. Twenty-five per cent. of the tourists remain here more than 3 days. At four passengers a car, over 3,000 people have patronized the camp, and figuring that each one spends an average of \$5 while here, as is considered a fair estimate, \$15,000 has been expended by the camping motorists in Kingston so far this summer. The camp opened on June 28th and will likely be kept open until the first of October.

The camping motorists have been noticed in many of the stores here, buying provisions and other things. The longer they stay the more they purchase, and every motorist who camps at Lake Ontario Park declares that Kingston is one of the finest places for tourists on the whole continent.

Every night scores of motor tourists secure rooms in hotels and rooming houses throughout the city. One place the other night took care of eleven of these tourists. Probably only one third of the motorists who come through here go into camp.

Writing to Mr. H. C. Niekke, Albert E. Heustis, Fitchburg, Mass., says: "I must write you to show in a small way how much we all appreciated your kindness on our visit to Kingston. It showed wonderful civic pride and also the typical Canadian hospitality."
