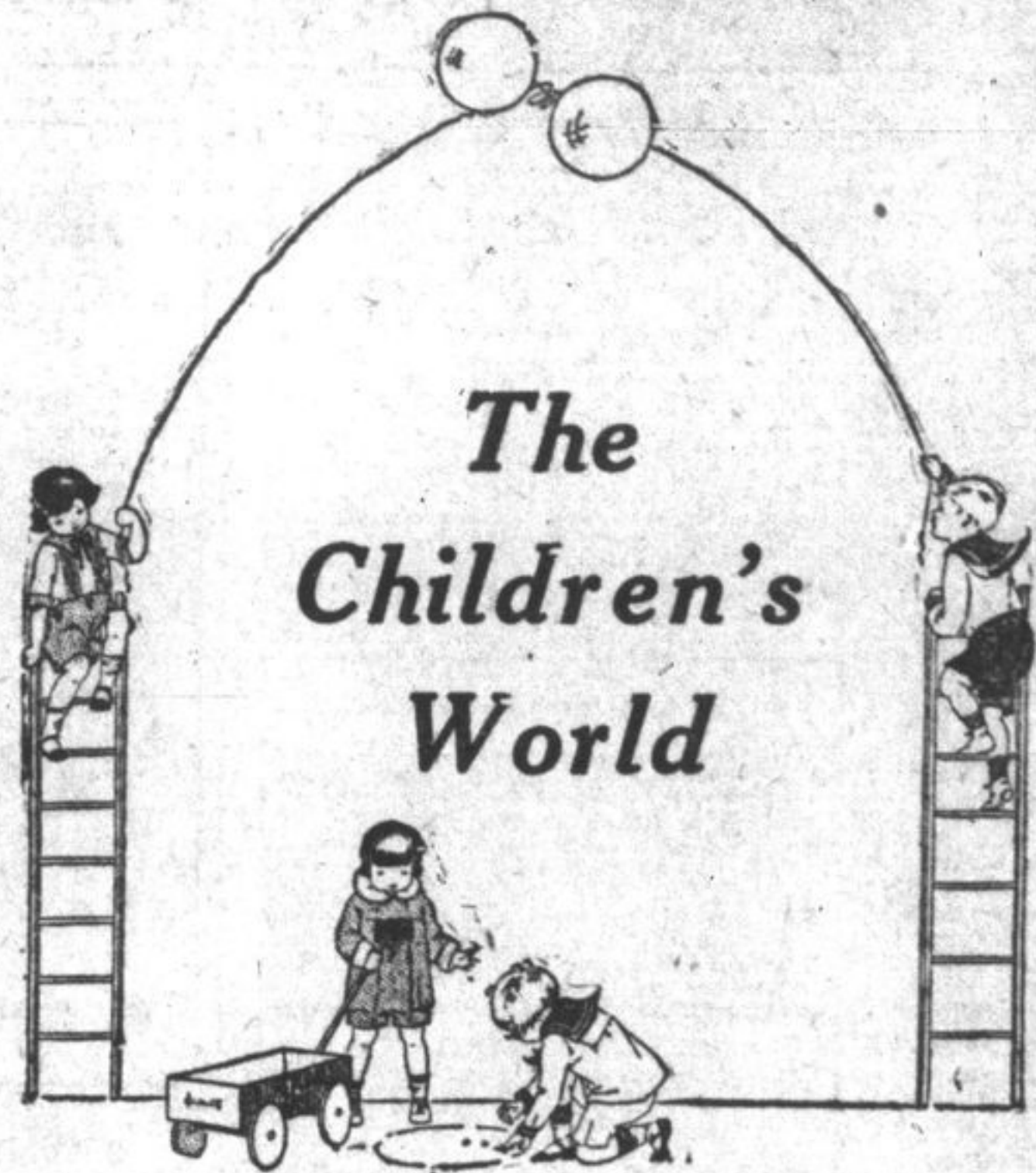
Kitties Band Excursion.
