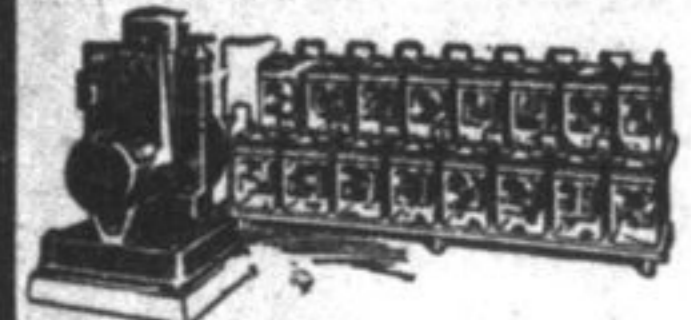

VETERAN ARCHITECT IS BORNE TO REST

Funeral of Late J. W. Power, One of Foremost Men in His Profession.

An architect who enjoyed a Dominion wide reputation was laid to rest in Cataract cemetery on Wednesday. He was Joseph William Power, C.F., A.R.C.A., F.R.A.I.C., senior member of the firm of Power and Son, who died in Florida on Friday last, after a lengthy illness.

The late Mr. Power was born in Kingston on October 17th, 1848, the son of the late John Power and Charlotte Clegg, of Colodon, Devonshire, England. His early education was secured in Kingston private and public schools, and at the Ontario College, Picton. Later he took a course at the Royal Military College and at the R.C.H.A. In 1881 he became senior member of the firm of Power and Son, which he had joined in 1873, and which was founded in 1847 by the late John Power.

Mr. Power was one of the foremost men in his profession. He was an associate of the Royal Canadian Academy, charter member, a member of the first council and past president of the Ontario Association of Architects, and fellow of the Royal Architectural Institute of Canada. For many years he was major in the P.W.O.R. Regiment.

Architecture demands a mind of unusual versatility, combining the science of the engineer, a scientific knowledge of materials and the taste and imagination of the artist. Mr. Power possessed these talents to a rich degree, as numerous buildings and private residences throughout Kingston bear testimony. Space does not allow an enumeration of his works, but such structures might be mentioned as St. George's Cathedral, St. Andrew's church, the Collegiate Institute, Central school, the Locomotive Works, Doran building, and the Whig building.

He was a gentleman of pleasant and courteous manner and an ardent worker for the best interests of the Limestone City.

His wife pre-deceased him a year ago last April.

Jolly Edna, one of a Canadian family of 12 children, all heavyweights, will help lure the crowds into the Canadian National Exhibition Midway. Her demure sister, weighing a paltry 213 pounds, is also with the show.

Opening of Fine New Headquarters Building Of Manufacturers' Life Insurance Company

be congratulated on its splendid staff of agents. Business comes from the activity of the agents and very little from those who sit at the head office," he remarked amid laughter. Life insurance, he went on, was something of which those connected with it might well be proud. At no time in the history of Canada had a policyholder lost a single dollar by reason of reverses in business. That was a wonderful record which he thought could not be equalled by any other business. "Governments he commented, can well co-operate with life insurance companies in the interests of the general public. Such work as Dr. Banting has done not only means increased business for life insurance companies, but by lessening risk to the company reduces cost to the policyholder. I think you will always find that the Ontario Government is prepared to promote investigation that will promote the health and lengthen the life of our people. That is where we can co-operate most closely with life insurance companies."

Spread of Activities.
Mayor Foster commented on the spread of the company's activities in other parts of the empire and the world drawing attention to the advertising that Canada gained thereby. Regarding the location of the new headquarters he thought that the directors had chosen an excellent site along one of the main arteries of traffic and in the centre of the city.

Sir William Mulock, who was also called on for a few remarks, commented facetiously on his near residence to the new building. "Here," he said, "I can have life insurance and across the road at St. Paul's fire insurance, for which Dr. Cody is the general agent." He endorsed the Premier's remarks about the company's agents, but gave the head office credit for making wise selections. Sir William concluded by offering himself as a subject for life insurance.

The President's Remarks.
President W. G. Gooderham in the course of his remarks said: "On behalf of the directors of the Manufacturers' Life Insurance Company I desire to extend a most cordial welcome to each of you and at the same time to thank you for doing us the honor of coming here today.

In particular, I would like to express the appreciation of the directors and of myself of Hon. P. C. Larkin, High Commissioner for Canada in London, an esteemed friend of many years who kindly consented to officiate at the opening of this building. The formal opening today by the High Commissioner for Canada marks the thirty-eighth anniversary of the founding of the company. Thirty-eight years ago this month the company commenced operations in a small office at 38 King street east, Toronto.

"Perhaps a few words in connection with the design and construction of the building may be of interest to you. The building has been designed in a modern Georgian renaissance style. It is six storeys high and is built of dressed Indiana limestone standing on a pink miford granite base. The main facade is featured by a doric colonnade composed of six fluted columns. The building is of fireproof construction throughout, being framed with steel columns and beams encased in brick work and with outer walls of brick faced with stone. The type of construction used for the floors and roofs is known as "Trus-con" construction. It consists of light steel beams supported by a thin slab of concrete on which is laid the flooring. I have been informed by the architect that this system was used on this building for the first time in Canada and has since been adopted in the construction of a number of buildings in Toronto.

"The building contains no fees of any description as the power house is a detached building some 400 feet from the main building, combined with it is a garage for the use of the officers and staff, a laundry and other quarters.

"As to the arrangement of the various floors, I may say that these have been laid out in a very simple manner. Four of the six floors contain no private offices but are simply large working spaces for the staff. One floor has been reserved for the board room and smaller rooms for the officers. The top storey has been reserved for this hall in which we met, the dining room and kitchen. We follow the practice which has been adopted by a number of financial institutions in providing noon day luncheon for the members of the staff.

"The growth of the company will undoubtedly entail additions to the building from time to time. In fact the plans of the building were completed with the knowledge that the building might have to be added to possibly within five years' time. Provision has therefore been made for the extension to the north of wings, one on the east side and another on the west side of the building."
