HINTS TO MOTORISTS

Lessening Lubrication Labor Hasten The Day Of The Strictly Automatically Oiled Car

THE LARGEST FACTOR in the care of a car is attending to its lubrication and insofar as this is made easy, the outlay of time and and attendent upon its ownership is curtailed. Manufacturers have long realized this and have constantly been making improvements in this direction.

An Important Consideration In Car Selection One who is about to buy a new car, which he is to care for himself, should-other things being equal-pick out the one which is most quickly and easily oiled and greased.

The Self Lubricated Engine The more nearly all moving parts of the engine are oiled from the crank-case supply, the handier its lubrication becomes and one may go further and say the more nearly the entire power plant is automatically oiled the nearer ideal it is. Some of the popularity of certain of the lowest priced makes is doubtless found in the fact that the engine, clutch and transmission are all oiled from a single supply. Power plants with numerous squirt-can holes, grease caps, pressure-gun fittings and separately supplied housings are objectionable from the above standpoint.

Running And Steering Gear Lubrication

Lubrication of chassis parts has been rendered comparatively easy by the introduction of pressure-gun systems and the use of self lubricating bushings, while the rubber shock-insulator at spring-ends is likely to be adopted. Oiling of these parts from a central point, by a single operation, easily performed at suitable intervals, is a time and labor-saving improvement already found on a few makes of cars. Hidden Grease Points Objectionable

The owner who is personally to maintain his own car should, in selecting it, give preference to one with an engine that is completely oiled automatically and one with the most conveniently lubricated chassis, assuming this car to be equal to the others considered in all other respects. So far as ease of attendance is concerned, cars with inaccessible oil and grease supply points, reached only by crawling underseath or taking up floor boards, are not desirable.
