Answers to Inquiries. "Reader Who Appreciates: I have learned so much from your column, and I am wondering if you can tell me one thing more: How to clean my alabaster vases?" Answer: Remove any stains from the alabaster by sponging with flannel moistened with spirits of turpentine. Wash with tepid suds of white soap and then wipe dry.

"Bride: I have been sealing my jelly glasses with paraffine, and using a valued pot as a container for the hot wax. Now I find I cannot get the paraffine from the inside of the pot. Have I ruined it forever?" Answer: No, the wax can be removed as follows: Fill the pot with boiling-hot water and let stand till this water cools—when you will find the paraffine floating on the top of the cooled water in a sheet which can be lifted out with a skimmer.
