THE BASEBALL CLASSIC.
Pittsburgh, Oct. 5.—With the ringing down of the curtain on the major league baseball season, the stage was being set to-day for the opening game of the world's series at Forbes Field, the home of the National League champions, the Pirates, who on Wednesday will enter the initial battle of the annual fall baseball classic as opponents of the Washington Senators, 1925 champions of the American League and defenders of the world's championship title.
