

Varsity Supporters Coming to Kingston in Large Numbers.

The demand for tickets from Toronto for the "Varsity-Queen's" game here on Saturday has been very heavy and J. S. McDonell, secretary of the Athletic Board of Control at Queen's, stated to-day that he believed that about 500 or 600 "Varsity" students would come to Kingston next Saturday.

A special train is being run from Toronto on Saturday morning, leaving Toronto at eight o'clock and arriving here about 12.30. The enthusiasm at "Varsity" is high and the Blue and White followers expect their team to upset the rugby dope.

Frontenac Jail Holds Record.

The Frontenac county jail appears to hold the record in regard to the feeding of prisoners. Last year, according to Governor Hawkey's report, it cost just 1 1/2 cents a day to feed a prisoner at the Union street prison. The Carleton county jail feeding figure was 15 1/2 cents a day, and the Grey County penal institution it cost 17.88 cents a day, an increase, instead of a decrease, as was the case in the local jail.
