THE STREET RAILWAY ACCIDENTS RECORDED

Two More So Far This Year as Compared to Same Period of 1924.

Accidents on the Kingston stree railway so far this year show an increase of two over the same period last year. From January to September in 1924, the accidents num-

bered 52 against 54 in 1925. Over fifty per cent. of the accidents are collisions with motor cars while the next biggest number is caused by alighting from the cars. Superintendent Nickle says that almost every one of these latter cidents was due to women getting off the cars backward. A notable feature is that no one inside the cars was injured.

Fatal accidents recur in cycles of six or seven years, the last one being a collision at the corner Division and Princess streets, about seven years ago.
