The main topic under discussion was the report of the boundary commission which was expected to be announced very soon. Free State ministers seem ed to be fairly certain that territory now in northern Ireland would be transferred to their government while many Unionists in Ulster were disposed to believe that the town o Newry might pass to the Free State but that part of Donegal would be added to Ulster territory.

The Free State had placed a tax of 33 1-3 per cent against certain imports from Northern Ireland, England and other countries, he said, but the Free State Government had met with deficits, while in Northern Ireland, without a tariff, the Government declared a surplus.
