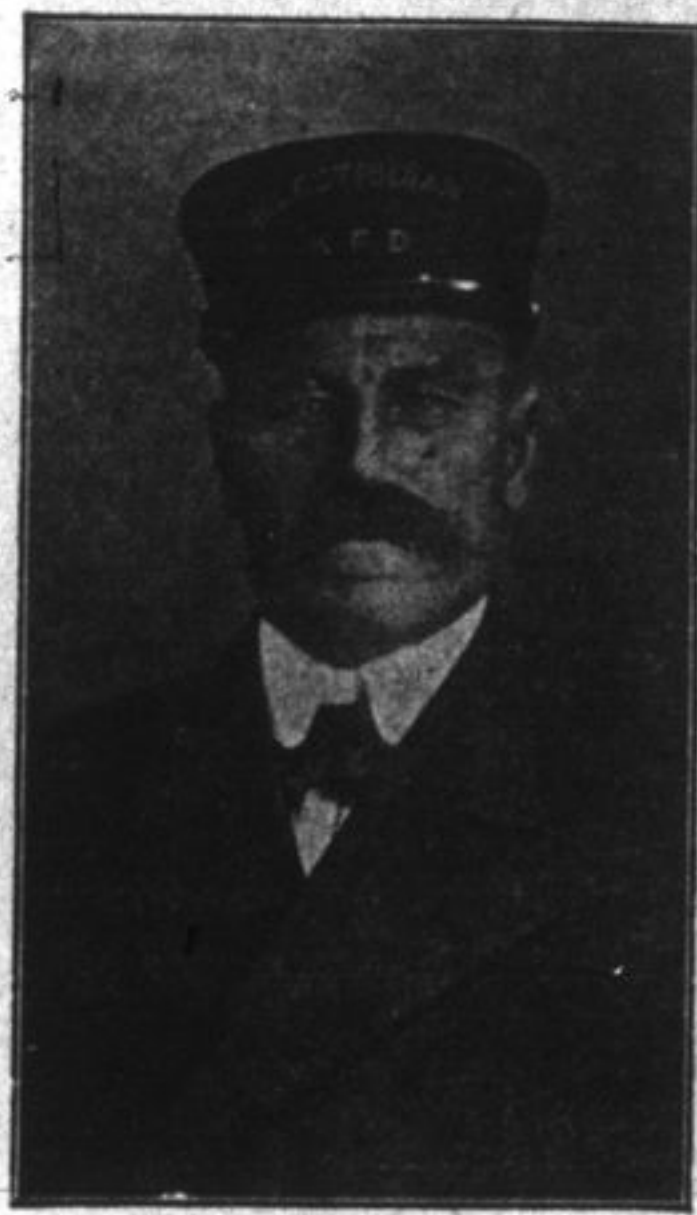

### SERVED FORTY YEARS ON FIRE DEPARTMENT

City Council Will. Further Honor John Hall, Kingston's Veteran Firefighter.

This is the proud record of John Hall, attached to the station on Ontario street, and at the meeting of the City Council to be held on Monday evening next, he will be presented with a bar for the medal he now holds, and which was presented to him when he completed twenty years' service on the department. This will make four bars for the veteran fireman, as one is presented every five years, after the completion of twenty years on the roll.

Fireman Hall has a very wide circle of friends, all of whom are pleased to hear of the honors bestowed upon him. He has been a faithful servant of the city, and well deserves the warm tributes paid to him by the fire and light committee and the city council as a whole.

For many years Mr. Hall has been engaged in looking after the fire alarm system, but he has also been doing his "bit" at fires. After a long term of service, it is the intention of the fire and light committee to add another member to the department, and to have the veteran serve in relief work.

### POULTRY FAIR DATES DEFINITELY FIXED

For Nov. 24 and 25 in Kingston—Big Supplies Are Promised.

The Council of the Board of Trade met on Tuesday afternoon. The city engineer is to be asked to provide plans and estimates for improvements to the fair grounds to make it a satisfactory amusement park. This to include fencing, an ornamental entrance, auto entrances, a new grand stand, lavatories, etc. A revenue was expected from all users of the grounds.

The poultry committee reported Nov. 24th and 25th as days for the poultry fair to be held here. Further details will be worked out.

The board was requested to send delegates to a conference of All Canada to bring about better relations with all parts of the country. The council asked for volunteers to attend the influential gathering.

The council named its members as delegates to the Associated Boards of Trade and Chambers of Commerce of Ontario Convention to be held here on Nov. 5th and 6th. Voting power being given to Messrs. Elliott, Campbell and Bishop. On Thursday afternoon the council will further discuss the details in connection with the local entertainment of the delegates.

### TWO AUTOS COLLIDE AND FALL INTO DITCH

One Was Going From Kingston to Bowesville—Ten Persons Shaken Up.

Carleton Place, Oct. 14.—The occupants of two cars numbering 10 persons in all, received slight injuries when in a collision on the 11th line of Beckwith about 7.30 o'clock Sunday night. The cars were driven by Joseph Johnston, a Chinese of Perth, and Mrs. Henry Hardy, of Bowesville, Ont.

Johnston's car, which contained beside himself one man, one woman, and four girls, all Chinese, was turned up-side-down in the ditch while Mrs. Hardy's car was pushed into the ditch and badly smashed. The other Chinese who was with Johnston, received a slight cut to his face which did not require medical attention.

Mrs. Hardy's car contained Mr. and Mrs. Hughes, of Bowesville, and two young girls, none of whom were injured.

According to Mrs. Hardy she was returning from Kingston when between Carleton Place and Ashton she saw another car approaching. She drove her own car as near as she dared to the ditch on the right hand side of the road, and slowed down. Her car was hardly moving when it was struck by the other machine and hurled into the ditch. When Mrs. Hardy and the other occupants got out they found that the other machine had turned turtle in the ditch on the same side of the road directly behind them. Mrs. Hardy believes that Johnston was on the wrong side of the road when the accident occurred.

Seeing the predicament of the occupants of the capized car, Mrs. Hardy ran up the road for about 100 yards and stopped a car coming in her direction and asked assistance. Returning to the scene of the accident Mr. Hughes and the driver of the third car managed to raise the wrecked machine so that the occupants could get out.

The Chinese were taken to Carleton Place where it was found that none of them had been seriously hurt. Mrs. Hardy's car was towed into Ashton and her party returned to their homes in the car of a friend.

It having been arranged some time ago to hold the convention every second year at the Dairy School in Kingston, and the convention for the present year having taken place in Cornwall, it follows that the next meeting will be held in the Limestone City.

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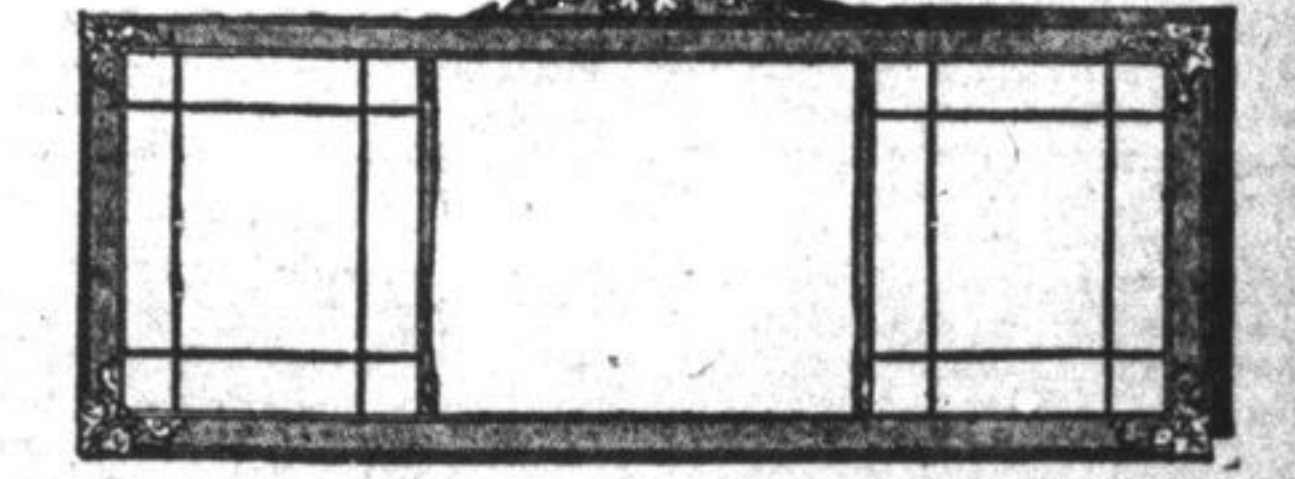
