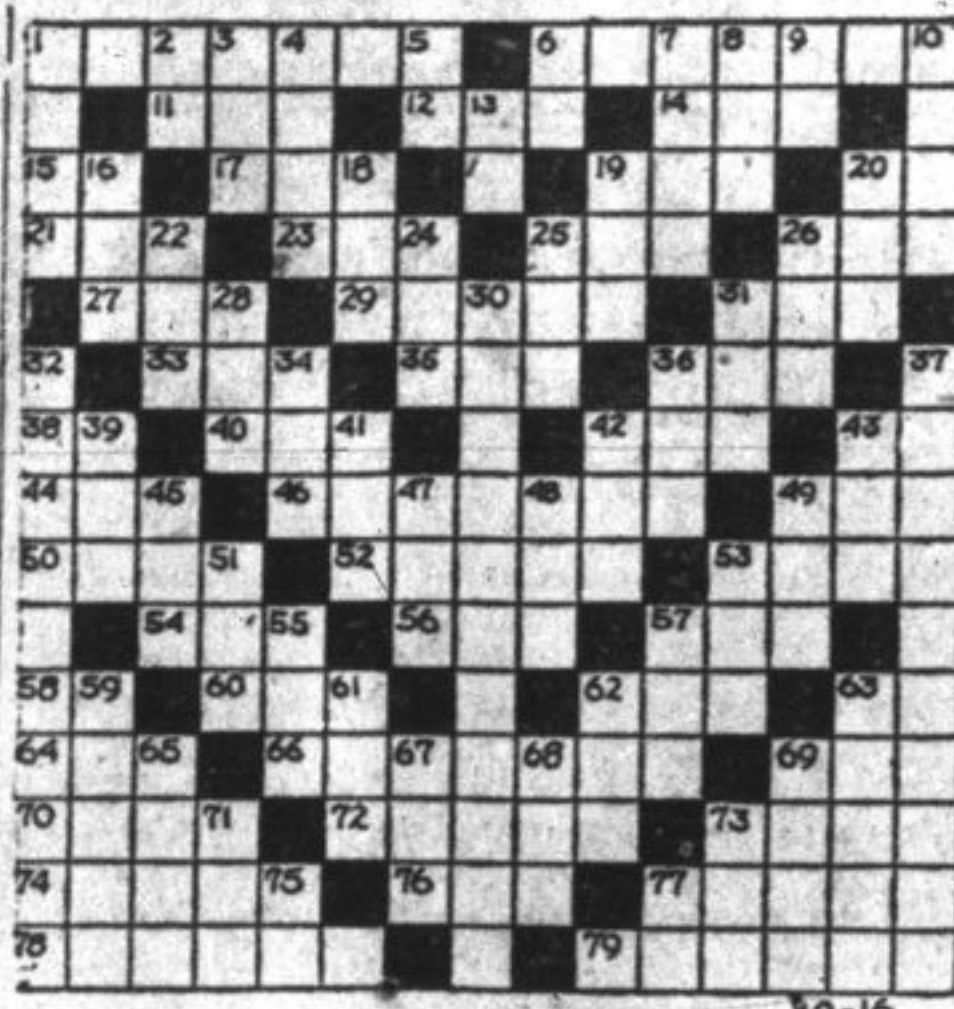


CROSS-WORD PUZZLE

There are 97 words in this crossword puzzle. How many of them do you know?

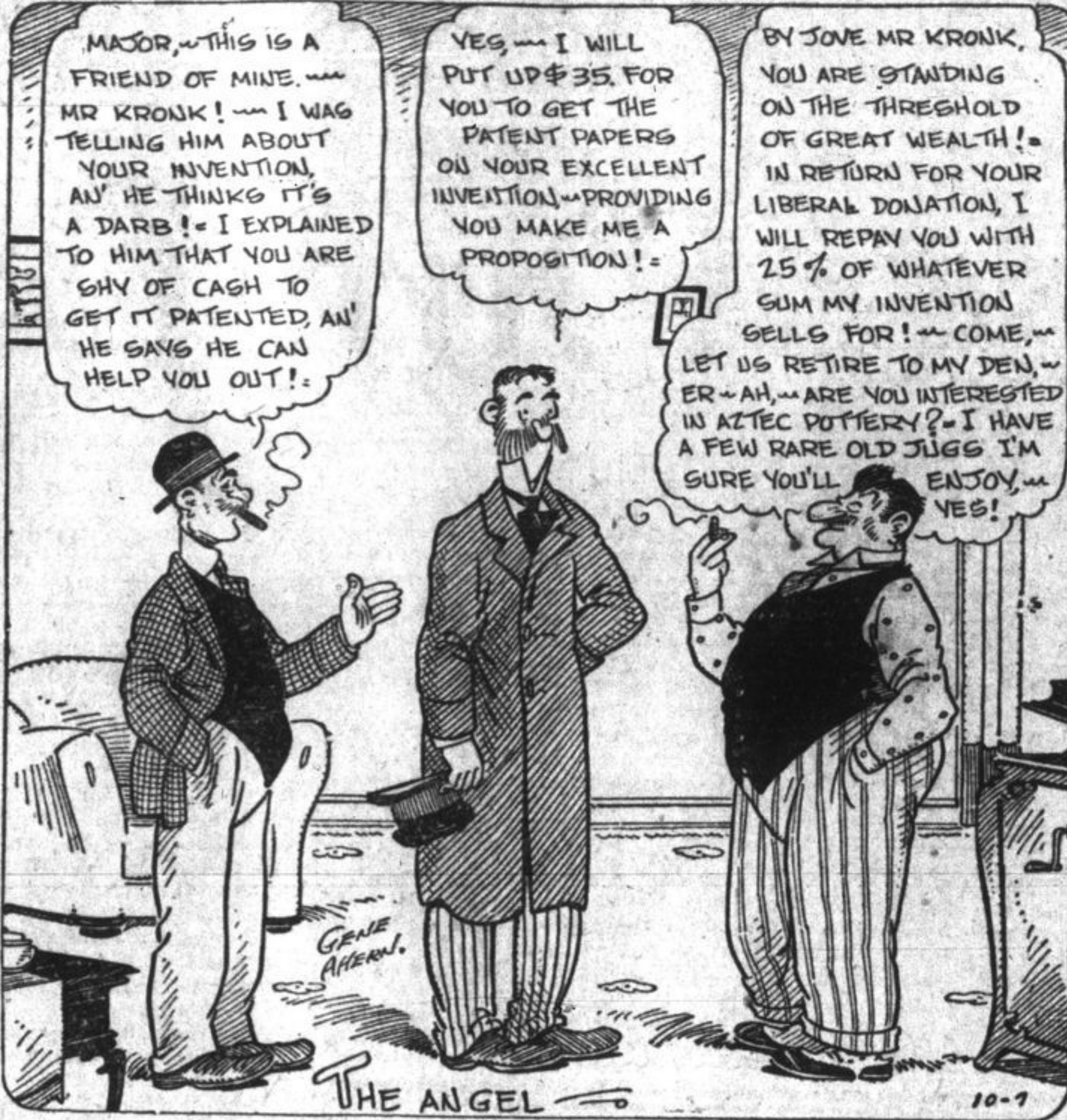
