Vessels Held Up. One of the worst gales of the season set in on the lakes on Monday morning, and as a result quite a fleet of vessels were forced to remain in port. One of the Canada Steamship boats cleared from Swift's wharf but was forced to return to port, owing to the fact that the wind was very high.

Cut Arteries in Foot. James Bunnett, Shannonville, met with an accident, on Saturday, when he cut the side of his right foot with an axe. The arteries were severed and the patient will be laid up in bed for some time. Some years ago Mr. Bunnett fractured the ankle of this foot and was slightly lame in that foot.

Fire Razes Residence. Saturday the house of William Beresford, near the head locks at Cardinal, was burned to the ground together with all its contents. The fire was first noticed by the captain of a passing steamer, who notified the lockman, who in turn roused Mr. Beresford and his son, who were asleep in the house.

Mr. Raney was able to conduct the evening services at his church, but the effects of his accident have forced him to rest up for a few days.

Thief in Room Woke Sleepers. The home of Ald. George Foster, Belleville, was entered early Monday by a thief, who secured a gold watch and chain, a fountain pen and an everready pencil from a suit of Mr. Foster's, hanging in the clothes closet at the top of the stairs. Prying about the house brought the sneak thief into the room where Mr. and Mrs. Foster were sleeping and he was disturbed in his quest by Mrs. Foster waking up and informing her husband. The thief escaped, the police were notified.

Status of Wife Restored. Minutes of settlement filed and confirmed by the First Divisional Court at Osgoode Hall set aside the judgment of Justice Orde which found that Rosey Knowlton was not the legal wife of the late John N. Knowlton, township of Crosby, near Brockville, and consequently neither she nor the three children she had by him were his legal heirs. The estate is to be divided equally between the two contending parties—Rosey Knowlton, her three children and the brothers and sisters of the deceased who contested the mother's right to succeed to the estate as his wife.

Two transformers on Princess street were put out of commission because of broken wires, and some houses were without lights for few hours.

Weather Delays Release.

No further word was received of the steamer Jaska of Kingston, which is ashore at Indian Point. The high wind of Monday stopped the work on it, but it was expected that it would be released Tuesday afternoon or Wednesday morning.

The fishermen around the head of Wolfe Island lost about \$1,000 worth of nets in the storm on Monday night. Just at the beginning of the salmon and whitefish run, this is a very serious blow.
