Mrs. William Robinson of North Fredericksburg Township, just outside the city limits and across the river from Napanee, was burned to death Wednesday afternoon in the pig pen next to the barn, in which fire broke out. It is believed that the little chap was in the barn and was playing with matches and the place being filled with grain, caught fire immediately.

The screams of the little fellow were heard but the fire was such that no one could enter. While the Whig was learning the details of the tragedy, the fire was still raging, and efforts were being made to get the boy's body out of the pig pen. The firemen from Napanee were called and rushed to the scene of the fire.

The remains of the lad were found at twenty minutes to three in the pen, east of the barn. Nothing but the bones remained, the body having been burned to a crisp.

Coroner Cowan of Napanee, Chief of Police Barrett and county officials were at the scene of the tragedy when the body was found.

(Continued from Page 1.) Liberalism that brought freedom and justice to Wales and that swept the aristocracy and the plutocracy from power. It was a Liberalism that was militant and red blooded.

The Whig editor is a Liberal because he believes in Liberal principles; because he knows that Liberalism has always stood for the rights of the common people against the privileges of the classes; because Liberalism has fought and bled for liberty, for freedom and for justice, and because Liberalism is to-day still holding aloft all over the world, the same high ideals that has guided its brilliant leaders in the past. There is nothing of the "tongue in cheek Liberalism" about The Whig to-day. It admires and believes in Mr. Mackenzie King. Not for a minute do we doubt his high ideals or his sincerity of purpose. We believe it is in the interests of the masses of this country that he should be supported; and be given a further opportunity to lower the cost of living, and relieve the burdened taxpayers. For that reason The Whig is supporting him and for no other. Loyal always; docile never.

FIREMAN HALL HAS INTERESTING CAREER

Recalls Work of the Volunteer Brigade With Hand Pumps At Many Big Fires.

Fireman John Hall, who was honored on Monday night, by the Kingston city council, with the presentation of a medal and efficient service, has some interesting stories to relate. He served for seven and one-half years on the volunteer force under Chief Devlin and for forty years on the regular

He recalls that the volunteer force consisted of twenty-one men, and that the hand pumps were used, at small fires. He was present at 'the burning of the Scotch Kirk, which stood where St. Andrew's church is located now. Another interesting blaze, that the old veteran recalls is the burning of the malt house twenty years ago. He dryly remarked, that it was not such a wet affair as some may think. Among some of the most outstanding fires that he remembers are the St. George's Cathedral fire, the burning of the Oddfellows Block, and the destruction of the Queen street Methodist church for the first time. He states that the old reservoir on Colborne street was frozen, and that this was the cause of the failure to save the Queen street church.

Mr. Hall has missed very few fires and has fought all the serious fires that Kingston has had in the last forty years. He is still hale and hearty, and takes a keen interest in his work.
