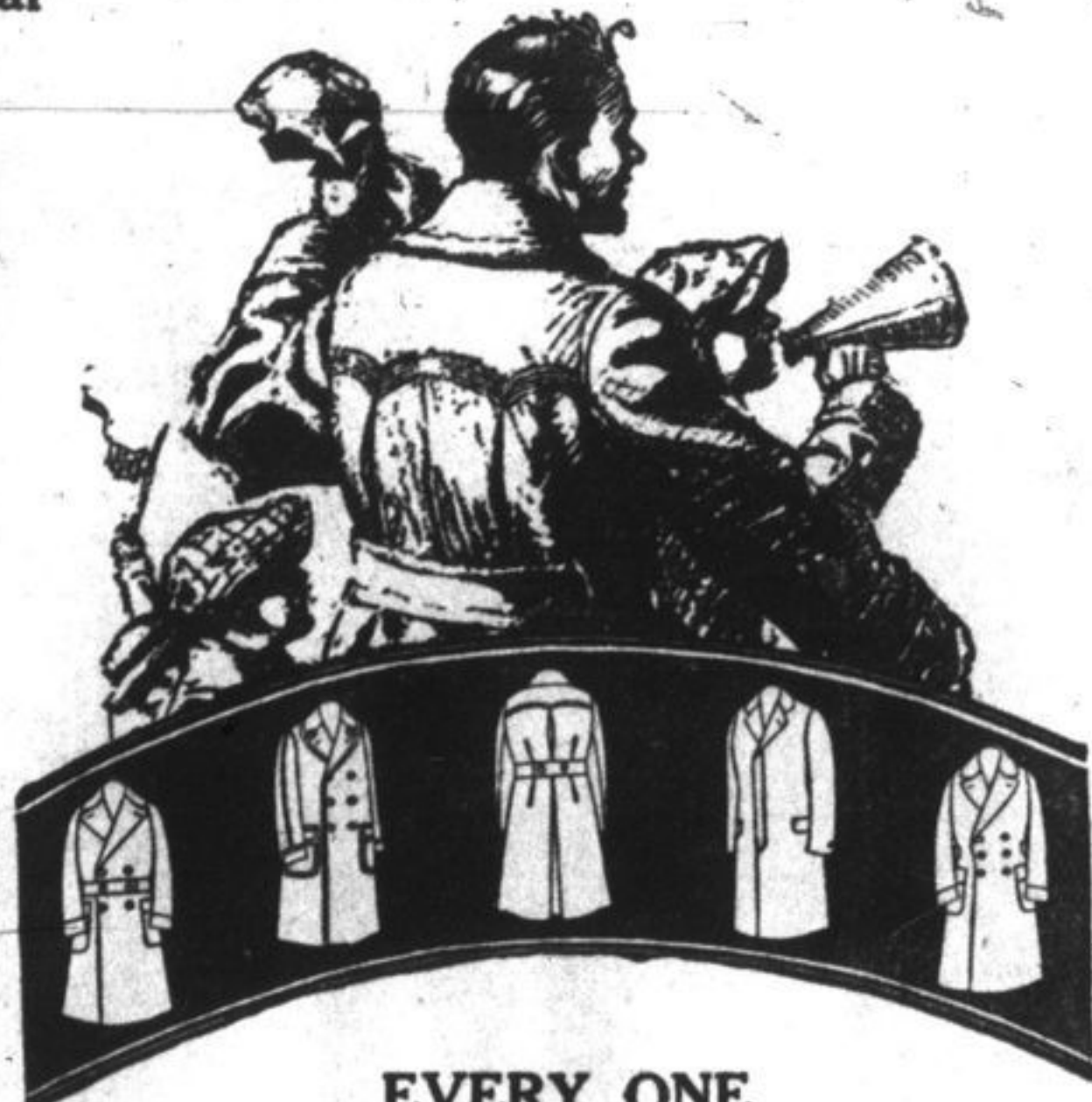

At present there are seventeen ships being operated on the lakes and river by this company.

Three months' imprisonment in Brockville jail was the sentence meted out at Smith's Falls to Roy Priget, Montreal, on a charge of issuing a cheque for which there were no funds. Later it developed that he had no account in any of the banks of that town and a warrant was issued for his arrest. Priget was subsequently arrested in Kingston.
