Charles Down, Sidney, was arrested for non-support of his wife and three children. He appeared before Magistrate Masson, Belleville, and pleaded guilty to the charge. The magistrate imposed sentence of one year suspended sentence and made him furnish a bond for \$1,000.

Buried At Tweed.
Mrs. Eliza Morrison, a former resident of Tweed, died at her home at Fairhaven, Mass., on Oct. 16th, aged sixty-six years. The funeral took place on Monday from the residence of her sister, Mrs. William Maguire, Tweed, to Victoria cemetery. Ernest Morrison, Madoc, is a son of deceased.

Struck a Bull Moose.
H. M. Boyd, Ottawa, driving home from Kingston, had a crash near Manotick, hitting a bull moose. He carried it on the hood for more than 20 feet, then tossed it aside, with considerable damage to his automobile, and unknown damage to the moose, which disappeared in the fields at the side of the road.

Were Heavily Fined.
A fine of \$25 and court costs of \$6 were imposed on both Mrs. Henry Hardy, Bovesville, and Joseph Johnston, Perth, by Magistrate Kirkland, in Carleton Place, when they appeared for sentence after being found guilty of violating the Highway Traffic Act. Both had the option of twenty-one days in Perth jail, but paid the fines.

Statement Hotly Resented.
The friends of Miss Marion Sangster hotly resent the statement published in the Standard that Miss Sangster left Kingston, for the United States, to look for work. There was no ground for the statement, save the political significance that might accrue from the fact that Miss Sangster is in the States, to take a course in nursing for service in her native land at a later date.

Teacher Had To Retire.
Miss Essie Dufoe, Madoc, teacher of Latin in the high school, Campbellford, for the past three years, suffered a nervous breakdown and has been compelled to give up her duties. She asked the Board of Education for an indefinite leave of absence, and this request has been granted. Miss Laura Stafford, whose home is in Waterford, was selected for the position.

A Perth Resident Dead.
On Oct. 26th, the death occurred in the Perth Memorial Hospital of William E. Wright, a native of Lanark and son of the late John Wright one of the pioneer settlers of that village. Deceased had suffered from heart trouble for the past ten years and had been a patient in the hospital for about six weeks. Mr. Wright was sixty-nine years of age and had been an employee of the Boyd Caldwell Co., all his life, holding the position of head fuller for forty years, with the firm. After the death of Mrs. Wright which occurred seven years ago, the home was sold and the family removed to Perth.

In Perth After 49 Years.
Mr. and Mrs. N. F. Brown, Cincinnati, Ohio, were visitors in Perth a visit of unusual interest from the fact that Mr. Brown was born in Perth, left forty-nine years ago and this was his first visit to town in all those years. Mr. Brown's father, the late Nicholas Brown, was employed as a tailor with the late B. H. Wright. The Brown family resided in the East ward and in 1876 a disastrous fire occurred which destroyed their and a number of other homes. Shortly afterwards in the same year the Brown family left Perth to reside in Albany, N.Y.
