MUST SHARE IN THE RESPONSIBILITY

Defendant Held Liable for Portion of Damages in Auto

Judgment has been handed down by Judge Lavell in the case of Hunter vs. Clyde, which was tried at a recent sitting of the Division Court here. The plaintiff's claim was for damage to his car by the defendant.

The plaintiff had parked his car on Wellington street, just north of Princess, and the defendant, turning the corner, ran into it. was shown that the defendant was under the influence of liquor at the time, but, on the other hand, it was contended that the palintiff's car was standing within seventy-five feet of a corner, contrary to a city by-law. The judgment finds that the acident was caused by the defendent's negligent driving, but also holds that the plaintiff was guilty of contributory negligence in having parked his car where he did.

The total amount of damages was \$109.50 and the judgment finds the before the war. defendant responsible for seventy per cent. of that sum with costs.
