WHIG GAVE RETURNS ON LANTERN SLIDES

Big Crowd Remained Until
Late Hour to Get Latest
Returns.

A large crowd thronged The Whig building and the streets in front of The Whig last night to receive the returns of the Federal election. Many were on hand at six o'clock, the hour the polls closed, and the first returns from a city subdivision were announced at 6.12 p.m. The hall on the third floor of The Whig was filled with ladies and many gentlemen also received the returns there, while the business office and editorial room accommodated a very large number. The full facilities of The Whig were placed at the disposal of its friends and the battery of telephones specially installed for the occasion was kept busy from six o'clock till midnight, giving out the returns to people who were not able to get downtown, and the outlying districts.

The results of the city contest were bulletined as the total of each polling place was rushed in by special messenger, while the results in other ridings were flashed across the street onto the Bank of Montreal building with a powerful lantern. It was mostly Liberals who came to The Whig Thursday night, and during the early part of the evening, when the results of Ontario were coming in, they found little to cheer about, but more encouraging reports began to come in from Quebec and the West about ten o'clock. It was after midnight, however, that the largest Liberal gains were reported.

Mr. J. M. Campbell, the Liberal candidate, along with the heads of the local Liberal organization heard the returns at The Whig office. While Mr. Campbell's defeat was very much regretted, the Liberal candidate never for a moment lost his cheery manner and took his defeat very philosophically, realizing that the Conservative policy was sweeping Ontario.

THE TORIES REDUCE OVER THEIR VICTORY

Dr. Ross and Dr. Edwards Carried on Shoulders of Supporters in Parade.

A large crowd gathered at The Standard office Thursday evening as the results came in.

As the Conservative majorities were announced, the crowd showed its sympathy for the Conservative cause.

When the final results were in from all over the city, and Portsmouth, and Hon. Dr. Ross was elected by a substantial majority, he was called upon to address the crowd.

Dr. Ross, stepping out from a window and holding onto a sign, addressed the crowd as follows:

"I want to thank you for your support, which has given me such a fine majority. A large body of people have gathered behind me, and given me their support. We have won, despite all opposition raised against me. I want to thank you all again, and I will not be able to repay you, but I will do my best." (cheers).

When it was ascertained that Dr. Ross and Dr. Edwards were both elected, the crowd, overwhelmed with joy, carried Dr. Edwards and Dr. Ross down Princess street, not forgetting to pay the Whig office and the Liberal committee debts, a visit.

The successful candidate accepted good naturedly, the over enthusiasm of their supporters, and withstood the ordeal.

At The Standard office Dr. Ross was met by his friends and heartily congratulated. Dr. Edwards also came in for his share of praise. Many of the rural residents came in especially to shake the hand of their new member.

EIGHTY-NINE YEARS OLD.

RAILTON BARN BURNED.

Was Situated on the Roman Catholic Church Grounds.

A frame barn on the Roman Catholic church grounds, at Railton, twelve miles from Kingston, was destroyed by fire on Thursday night. The barn contained four tons of hay, but otherwise there was nothing of any value in the barn.

MUST SHARE IN THE RESPONSIBILITY

Defendant Held Liable for Portion of Damages in Auto Smash.

Judgment has been handed down by Judge Lavelle in the case of Hunter vs. Clyde, which was tried at a recent sitting of the Division Court here. The plaintiff's claim was for damage to his car by the defendant, in a collision.

The plaintiff had parked his car on Wellington street, just north of Princess, and the defendant, in turning the corner, ran into it. It was shown that the defendant was under the influence of liquor at the time, but, on the other hand, it was contended that the plaintiff's car was standing within seventy-five feet of a corner, contrary to a city by-law. The judgment finds that the accident was caused by the defendant's negligent driving, but also holds that the plaintiff was guilty of contributory negligence in having parked his car where he did.

The total amount of damages was \$109.50 and the judgment finds the defendant responsible for seventy per cent. of that sum with costs.
