

#### THE RESULT.

The reason for this decided change in public opinion is not hard to account for. The feeling of unrest that has permeated the world since the great war, seems to be still with us, and governments in all countries are short-lived. We are living in a restless age and the desire for continual change is much more marked than it was two decades ago. Since the war France has had innumerable governments, and even in Great Britain we have seen four new governments in six years.
