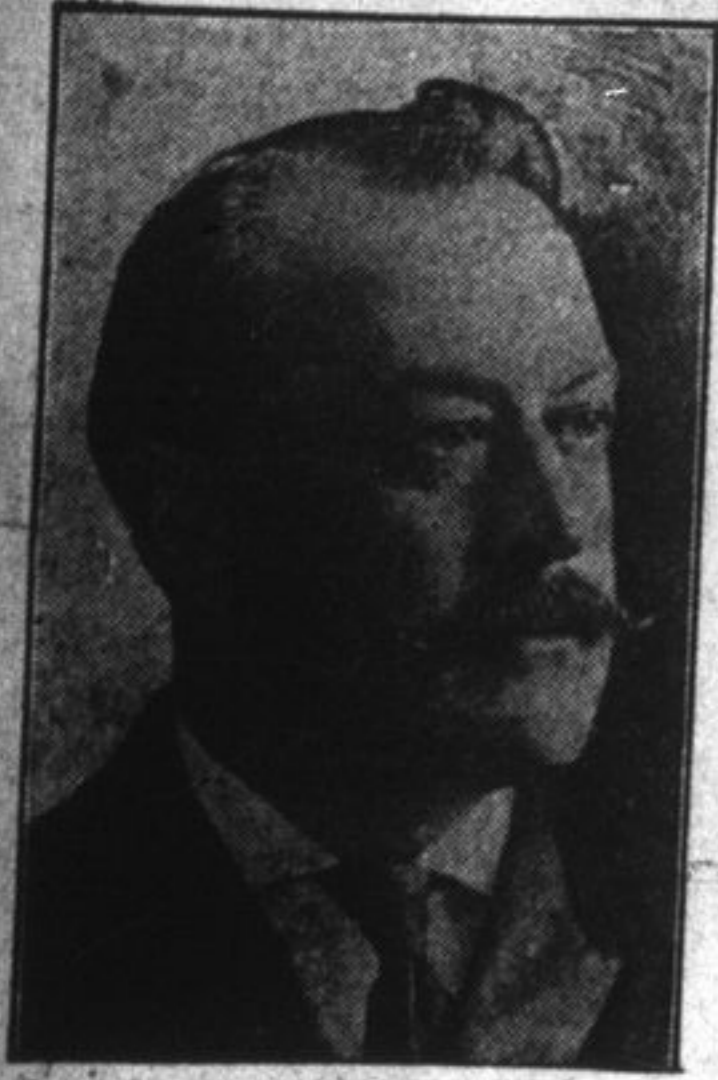


# DR. EDWARDS WAS ELECTED

Defeated W. S. Reed in Frontenac-Addington by About 2,000 Majority.

Although the vote was far from being complete on Friday morning at nine o'clock, it looks very much as though Dr. J. W. Edwards of Sydenham has been elected member for the riding of Frontenac-Addington by a majority of 1981 over W. S. Reed, the former Progressive member. A large number of the polls from the back part of the riding have not reported, but it is expected that they will show majorities in favor of Mr. Reed.

A great deal of trouble was experienced in getting the results, owing to the returning officers not re-

porting the vote in each case but only majorities.
