A By-law to grant a fixed assessment to the Monarch Battery Company, Limited.

This is the title of a By-law which will be submitted to the electors of this Municipality at the time of the Municipal Elections. It contains the following sections:

1.-The assessment of the said property to the Monarch Battery Co. Ltd., including land, buildings and business assessments shall be fixed at One Thousand Dollars.

2.-The fixed assessment shall not be for a longer period than ten years and shall not apply to or effect taxation for school purposes or local improvements.

NOTICE is hereby given that the foregoing is a true synopsis of a proposed By-law of the Corporation of the City of Kingston which has been taken into consideration and which will be finally passed by the Council of the said Corporation in the event of its receiving the affirmative vote of three-quarters of the members of the City Council and the assent of two-thirds of the electors qualified to vote on Money By-laws who vote on the By-law.

1.-The votes of the electors of the Corporation of the City of Kingston shall be taken upon the said proposed By-law at the same time and at the same place as the annual election for the Municipal Council, and the Deputy Returning Officers appointed to hold said election shall take the votes.

2.-On the 8th day of December, 1926, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, the Head of the Council of the said Corporation or some other Municipal Officer Council-appointed for the purpose of receiving in the said Municipality for the purpose of appointing, and if requested so to do, shall appoint by writing signed by him two persons to attend at each polling place on behalf of the electors interested in and opposing the said proposed By-law.

3.-On the 8th day of December, 1926, at the hour of eleven o'clock in the forenoon, the Municipal Clerk of the said Municipality shall attend and sum up the votes given for and against the proposed By-law.
