WINDSOR IS IN SENIOR O.H.A. SERIES

University of Toronto Must Make Decision re Allan Cup Finals.

Toronto, Nov. 7.—Border Cities Hockey Club of Windsor was admitted to the senior series of the O. H. A. at a meeting of the executive held here Friday night but cannot draw on players from Walkerville or any of the other border cities. They must also enter a junior team in accordance with the constitution of the Ontario Hockey Association. Osgoode Hall and Toronto Canoe Club were also taken into the senior series.

Walkerville and Wingham were admitted to the intermediate series. It was decided by the executive that if the University of Toronto wished to play in the O.H.A. senior series it must take its chance in the Allan Cup playdowns through that body. This decision means that if U. of T. should be beaten in the O. H. A. and win the intercollegiate championship they could not take part in the Canadian championship series, or if they won both series they would go through as an O.H.A. team. Of course if U. of T. decided to play only in the intercollegiate and won the championship of that Union they could take part in the Allan Cup games. There will be another meeting next Friday night when applications for change of residence and clubs will be considered.

**Y.M.C.A. ROAD RACE.**  
Keen Interest in the Events to be Held on the Holiday.

Keen interest is being taken by the boys of the city, in the road races to be held on Thanksgiving Day by the Y.M.C.A. The five mile race is attracting more attention from the Queen's students than among the boys of the Y.M.C.A. The Nelles Shield competition is open to the boys of the city, and is sanctioned by the Y.M.C.A. Athletic League. All competitors must be registered either with Y.M.C.A. League or the A.A.U. of C.

The Stagg and Hoag shields are only open to members of the Y. M. C. A., and are two and three mile competitions respectively. An admission fee of ten cents is charged to all entrants of these events.
